

#### **Cannabis Establishments in Boston**

- Pursuant to Massachusetts General Law Boston must site a minimum of 52 retail recreational cannabis dispensaries. This number excludes other cannabis uses such as medical, cultivation, laboratory, manufacturing, and delivery.
- Mayor Walsh and the Boston City Council passed an ordinance establishing the Boston Cannabis Board (the "BCB") which is the authority tasked with siting cannabis establishments in Boston. The BCB consists of five appointed individuals tasked with ensuring equity in the issuance of cannabis licenses both in terms of to whom they are issued and where in the City they are issued.

Total Recreational or Co-Located: 32 (3 recreational open for operations; 2 open for medical pending CCC co-located approval; 27 pending CCC)

## **Evaluating an Application**

- The Ordinance establishing the BCB also establishes the criteria each member of the BCB uses in evaluating the appropriateness of the proposed time, place, and manner of a cannabis establishment. The score sheet and guidance used by each member of the BCB is available on the website: <u>Boston.gov/cannabis</u>.
- Every application is evaluated on its individual merits pursuant to the ordinance. There is no maximum or minimum score necessary to grant a license. Instead, the scoring is used by each member of the BCB to guide the deliberations.

### Buffer Zone:

There are two (2) Buffer Zones applicable to cannabis establishments regardless of license type.

 School Buffer Zone: Pursuant to Massachusetts General Law a cannabis establishment cannot be located within 500 feet of an existing public or private K-12 school providing education. There is no waiver to the School Buffer Zone. 2. Half Mile Buffer Zone: Pursuant to the City of Boston's Zoning Code, in order to site a cannabis establishment within a half mile of an existing cannabis establishment, the BCB applies a heightened level of scrutiny as defined in its Rules and Regulations. This also requires a variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals.





# **Boston Equity Program**

- The Boston Equity Program was created by An Ordinance Establishing Equitable Regulation of the Cannabis Industry in the City of Boston to counteract the devastating impacts of the "War on Drugs", which disproportionately affected people of color, particularly Black, Latino, and Asian residents living in the Roxbury, Dorchester, and Mattapan neighborhoods of Boston.
  - The Boston Cannabis Equity Program provides technical assistance to equity applicants, which include services such as:
    - Technical assistance with business operations, including the development of business plans.
    - Technical assistance recruiting employees.
    - Guidance and assistance through the application process.
    - Technical assistance with legal compliance.
    - Accounting and tax preparedness assistance.
    - Best practices for operating in the marijuana industry.
    - Technical assistance with store security.
    - Technical assistance identifying and raising funds and capital and identifying vendors.

It is important to note that equity applicants/licenses must continue to meet all Equity Program eligibility criteria to benefit from the Equity Fund and Boston Cannabis Equity Program.

## **Boston Equity Fund**

- The purpose of the Boston Equity Fund and Boston Cannabis Equity Program is "...to support Equity Applicants and Licensees...to establish and operate a cannabis business in the City of Boston."
  - The benefits of the Equity Fund and the technical assistance program are available to certified equity applicants and licensees. Certified equity applicants/licensees have met the following criteria set forth in the Ordinance:
    - A person who has resided in an area of disproportionate impact, as defined by the Cannabis Control Commission, for at least 5 of the last 10 years;
    - A person who has a past arrest or conviction for the possession, sale, manufacturing, or cultivation of Marijuana between 1971 and 2016, who has been a resident of Boston for the past 5 years; OR a person who is the child of a person with a past arrest or conviction for the possession, sale, manufacturing, or cultivation of Marijuana between 1971 and 2016, who has been a resident of Boston for the past 5 years;
    - A person who has resided in the City of Boston for at least the past 7 years;
    - A person who is of Black, African American, Hispanic, Latino or Asian descent;
    - A person whose annual household income is at or below 100% of the area median income;
    - A person who has been certified by the Cannabis Control Commission as an Economic Empowerment Applicant and is a resident of Boston for at least one of the last three years.
  - The Equity Fund offers grants to certified applicants and licensees for a wide range of purposes including working capital, startup costs, build out, equipment purchases, and rent.
