

DEMOGRAPHIC

Interpretation of Table 1: This survey is a collective voice of a diverse population in the city of Boston, including Non-Hispanic Black (63.7%), Hispanics (14.8%), and other People of Color (13.6%). Our organization collected surveys from two age groups (6 to 14 years old and 15 to 19 years old). The majority of participants were female (5.4%), and 42.5% were male. Most participants were from the surrounding neighborhood of Blue Hill Ave, including Dorchester (21.6%), Mattagan (21.6), and Hyde Park (17%).



Responding to Common Questions





We've received a lot of design-related questions. For example:

- Has there been a feasibility study?
- Where can we place more street furniture and seating?
- Can the placement of crosswalks be moved/adjusted at areas where we see a lot of jaywalking?
- Can the city look at the concurrent pedestrian and vehicle lights at the intersection of Blue Hill Ave and Morton St? The current situation is dangerous for pedestrians.



Design Process Updates

Current Status:

 The design team is reviewing community feedback collected to date and looking at various alternative design scenarios for the corridor based on that feedback and transportation planning principles.

 To evaluate these design options, the design team will use metrics to compare alternative design scenarios at each stage of the process.

- Best practices (design professionals)

HOW ARE METRICS USED?

What are metrics used for?

Metrics can be utilized to compare alternative design scenarios at each stage of the design process.

Three categories of draft metrics:

- 1. Quantitative metrics that can be added up along the corridor to be compared across alternative design scenarios.
- 2. Before and after comparisons at specific locations
- Qualitative metrics analyzed at the corridor level across alternative design scenarios

WHAT WE'VE HEARD

We have received the following questions from the community, which has informed the design metrics, and will be taken into consideration as design options are evaluated:

- Will the project improve pedestrian access and safety along the corridor?
- Will parking spaces be preserved?
- Will parking and traffic enforcement in the project area be evaluated?
- Will bus ridership data be examined and reviewed throughout the design process?
- Will the demand for and impact of bike lanes be examined?
- Will to project create new spaces and develop green infrastructure in the corridor?
- Will the design connect into both existing and planned broader Boston transportation networks?



CATEGORY 1

Quantitative Metrics to be Compared Across Design Scenarios:

- Bus stop locations and bus ridership
- Pedestrian access/safety
- Parking spaces
- Street trees
- Bike Lanes
- New "people spaces" available for plazas, landscaping, etc



CATEGORY 2

Before and After Comparisons at Specific Locations

- Pedestrian access/safety
- The number and type of general traffic lanes at each major intersection
- Municipal parking lots



CATEGORY 3

Qualitative Metrics Analyzed at the Corridor Level

- Pedestrian access/safety
- Bike access/safety
- Parking & Traffic Enforcement resources required



NEXT STEPS

Next Steps in the Design Process:

- Collect community feedback on the metrics
- Perform an analysis of the alternative design options using the metrics
- Share the results of the analysis with the City, elected officials and community members in June




