

City of Boston Community Benefits Report
 Tufts University - Calendar Year 2022

Process Summary

The Office of Government and Community Relations at Tufts University collected data on programs, volunteer efforts, donations, and services that faculty, staff, and students provided to the City of Boston and/or its residents during calendar year 2022. This includes financial aid grants for students from Boston that are solely based on need. A separate report is submitted to the cities of Medford and Somerville. The data on the following pages is separated by schools and departments. For volunteer service, the dollar value was calculated using the Independent Sector's 2022 valuation (\$29.95/hour).

Tufts University's benefits contribution to the City of Boston that is calculated in this report is **\$14,889,304**.

The following are not included in the final benefits contribution, but are important to note for Calendar Year 2022.

- Tufts University paid \$31,879.31 in property taxes to the City of Boston in 2022.
- Tufts University paid the City of Boston \$450,000 in PILOT payments.
- 3,527 Tufts University alumni live in the City of Boston.
- 588 Tufts University employees live in the City of Boston, with a combined salary of \$46,783,216 annually.
