Did you know...

Category-3 Hurricane Carol, with wind gusts of 135 mph, caused 68 deaths and \$461 million in damage in 1954.*



Oceans are warming.

Hurricanes, especially major ones, are projected to occur more frequently. Major hurricanes in the Atlantic Ocean have doubled since 1980.**



Hurricane season is June -November Tropical storms (winds above 39 mph) and hurricanes (winds above 74 mph) are dangerous and can cause significant damage from several storm hazards including:



Heavy rainfall



Storm surge and rip currents



of fast-moving flood water can knock you down



Powerful winds and tornadoes



Coastal and inland flooding of moving water can sweep away your vehicle

BEFORE A HURRICANE

☐ Visit Boston.gov/emergency to:

- Sign up for emergency alerts.
- Create an emergency kit.
- Make an emergency plan.
- Identify if you or someone in your household may need additional assistance. For guidance, visit www.ready.gov/disability
- Know if you live or work in an evacuation zone.
- Locate emergency shelters.

■ Be prepared to lose electricity, water, gas, or internet.

- Make sure electronics are charged.
- Have backup water available.

☐ Strengthen your home.

- Clear drains and gutters.
- Bring outdoor items indoors.
- Seal windows and doors to keep water out.

DURING A HURRICANE

- **Evacuate** if officials recommend.
- ☐ Seek shelter:
 - Stay away from windows and doors.
 - Move to the highest floor if you are trapped by flooding.
- **Monitor the forecast** and pay attention to emergency alerts.
- ☐ Do not walk, swim, or drive through floodwaters.

WATCH



Be Prepared! Hurricane or tropical storm conditions are possible within the **next 48 hours.**

WARNING



Take action! Sustained winds of > 74 mph for a hurricane or > 39 mph for a tropical storm are expected within the **next 24 hours.**

AFTER A HURRICANE

- Follow instructions from public safety officials.
- Call 9-1-1 to report emergencies (including downed power lines and gas leaks).
- Stay out of damaged buildings.
- Protect yourself during clean-up with gloves and boots.
- Disinfect anything that got wet.
- Discard spoiled food.
- Photograph damage and contact your insurance provider.
