1 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

FUTUREBOS - A DIGITAL HUB THAT CREATES A CENTRALIZED YOUTH JOBS APPLICATION EXPERIENCE

YEO wants futureBOS to be the starting point of every young person's career exploration journey.

The Office of Youth Employment and Opportunity (YEO) employs, develops, and engages Boston's youth by exposing them workforce bridging to the and opportunities for personal and professional growth. The launch of the futureBOS jobs past summer reflects this investment of an ecosystem of jobs dedicated providers creating to opportunities for young people. For YEO, futureBOS provides young people with a central platform that encompasses all youth jobs opportunities and internships made possible through ongoing collaborations and partnerships across the city. It also provides young people with all the tools needed to get hired, onboarded, and ready to work. For young people, futureBOS is the digital platform that jumpstarts their careers.

YEO took the time to understand what people need most to get youth hired. After hosting focus groups with students, having conversations with school administrators, and gathering insights from program and policy leaders across the city, YEO launched a collection of employment centering people resources young alongside a variety of meaningful and experiences engaging career across different industries.



On futureBOS, you'll find onboarding document checklists available in eleven languages, a step-by-step guide for landing a summer job or internship, an overview of what youth need to secure a work permit, tips for a successful job experience, information about no-fee youth bank accounts, and more. This summer, young people were able to navigate to the futureBOS platform to find thousands of job opportunities that added meaning and enrichment to their career development journeys. The launch of the futureBOS youth jobs portal will continue to be a digital representation of the numerous connections across the ecosystem that make youth jobs possible.

FULFILLING THE MAYOR'S YOUTH JOBS GUARANTEE BY STRENGTHENING CONNECTIONS WITH BPS

Establishing renewed focus across the city, within the school district, and in BPS schools, allows us to center equity in everything we do and serve Boston's young people.

This summer, Mayor Michelle Wu reinforced her commitment to the creation of equitable opportunities and Boston Public School (BPS) students by launching the Mayor's Youth Jobs Guarantee – which promises that every eligible BPS student who wants a youth job can have one. YEO actualized this promise by creating close connections with BPS stakeholders across the district, within schools, and directly to students.

To accomplish this, YEO launched citywide application and onboarding campaigns that encouraged early applications to job opportunities and held workshops that provided direct 1:1 application and onboarding support to students in schools.

Through these promotional campaigns and with a series of virtual and in-person youth jobs support workshops, YEO was able to help hundreds of young people and families across BPS schools. This summer, thanks to the support of Boston PIC career specialists, YEO could refer young people to youth jobs, solidifying connections to direct job support. To make it easier for young people to secure work permits, we offered health clinics specific to BPS students. This made it easy for BPS students below the age of 16 to secure the health certificates they need to receive clearance to work. All these initiatives contributed to actualizing the Mayor's Youth Jobs Guarantee, by providing tailored investment in uplifting the BPS student community.



MOBILIZING THE YOUTH JOBS PROVIDER ECOSYSTEM - STRENGTHENING ALIGNMENT ACROSS THE CITY

The value of partnerships in expanding access to youth opportunities is central to achieving our mission of developing Boston's future workforce.

Over the summer, YEO strengthened connections within the futureBOS youth jobs ecosystem, a collaborative network of job providers across the private sector, city departments, non-profits, local businesses, and higher education to align efforts in developing Boston's future workforce.

enhanced communication Through quarterly convenings with ecosystem leaders, YEO created and enhanced structures that optimized our support to Boston's young people. This summer, ongoing communication across our partnership network allowed us to seamlessly share information that accurately captures key metrics central to the job hiring and onboarding process. By increasing our alignment amongst our partners, we have also been able to center data sharing and transparency as a common best practice, which has allowed YEO to optimize youth job placements across our network and inspire an increased and renewed vision towards citywide hiring goals.

YEO also continued to partner closely with the Boston Private Industry Council to expand job offerings to internships within the private sector, diversifying job industry offerings for young people and increasing the number of employer-paid job opportunities overall.

Our partnership with the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Advancement allowed us to focus on key high-needs populations within Boston, which made youth leadership development opportunities more accessible for more of Boston's young people, regardless

of immigration status. Partnerships with the Commonwealth Corporation and YouthWorks allowed us to continue to develop the career skills of Boston's future workers. Ongoing collaborations with YEO and the City of Boston's Center for Working Families offered free, non-predatory bank account services and financial literacy training to more young people than ever, empowering Boston's youngest workers with financial literacy skills they will need in their futures.

IN CONCLUSION

Our full report captures the entirety of the accomplishments made this summer with a renewed focus and commitment to engaging, developing, and employing Boston's young people. YEO is excited about the work that has been done this summer to achieve these goals and looking forward to what the future has in store.


A RECORD SUMMER: BIGGER, BETTER, BOLDER

2 EMPLOYING BOSTON'S YOUTH

The Employment and Grants teams provide direct employment support to both employer partners and youth workers, and issue grant funding to community-based organizations.

EMPLOYMENT TEAM

This summer, the Employment team played a crucial role in launching YEO's Youth Welcome Center, where our staff were present daily, ready to support young people every step of the way through the application and onboarding processes. We also held five We Hire Youth Events in our office. During these events, Boston youth could apply for jobs, be walked through onboarding, and be directly placed into an open position onsite.


FUTUREBOS JOBS PORTAL

GRANT AND COALITION PARTNERSHIP MODEL



3 ENGAGEMENT & OUTREACH

PRESS COVERAGE

YEO's SuccessLink Program was featured in **USA Today!** The story details how money from youth jobs supports young people and their families.

CITYWIDE ENGAGEMENT

In February, YEO's Engagement and Outreach Team launched a three-month-long promotional campaign, expanding awareness of the youth jobs program across the city at 25 bus shelters in highneeds areas and on 51 digital advertising screens. Later in March, YEO's Citywide Jobs Fair saw record attendance, with 1,887 youth attending the event.

In addition to five Neighborhood Pop-Up employment **Fairs** that brought opportunities, job readiness resources, and application assistance underrepresented areas, the Engagement and Outreach Team created onboarding guides, a step-by-step guide to landing a job, information on how to succeed in a new job or internship, and additional resources in eleven different languages, serving demographics of youth that needed additional support.

CREATING AN INCLUSIVE AND WELCOMING WORKFORCE

To support employer partners in running a successful youth jobs program this summer, our office launched a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Academy to educate partners on best practices to elevate and advance diversity, equity, and inclusion within Boston's youth workforce. The DEI Academy equips partners with tools to equitably recruit, interview, and hire young people in a way that is reflective of our City.

To capture the overall youth jobs experience for young people, YEO distributed weekly wellness checks via text messages. These wellness checks helped YEO center the youth experience and assess the quality of summer jobs across job sites.

3 CAREER READINESS

The Workforce Development Team equips young people with the *skills they need to succeed in the workforce*. We cover topics such as resume-building, interviewing, and worker rights. YEO also partners with YouthWorks, a statewide program that helps youth develop the personal and professional skills they need to find and keep jobs.

YOUTH WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOPS

SPARK

The Career Development Team held **three Find Your SPARK workshops** this year. These workshops focus on self-reflection, motivation, and goal setting to discover the intent behind a career choice.

ENTREPRENEURIAL EXPLORATION

Three Entrepreneurial Exploration workshops were held in collaboration with the Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship, totaling *nine hours of training*.

CAREER EXPLORATION

This workshop helps youth recognize personal strengths and challenges to design a career path. Following a recent workshop, 82% of attendees felt more prepared to make healthy and responsible decisions for their career path.



MAYOR'S YOUTH JOB GUARANTEE

This summer, Mayor Michelle Wu made an extraordinary promise, guaranteeing a summer job to every eligible Boston Public School student who wanted one. This promise paid off, as over 50% of youth participants in the 2024 Summer Program were BPS students.

INCREASING BPS ENGAGEMENT

This summer, YEO increased collaboration with Boston Public Schools (BPS), hosting a series of workshops and informational sessions. This increased involvement was to ensure that all BPS students are aware of the Summer Jobs Program, Mayor Wu's Youth Jobs Guarantee, and the workforce development resources our office offers.

3 BANK ON BOSTON

BANK ON BOSTON

This summer, the City of Boston partnered with Metro Credit Union, M&T Bank, and Citizens Bank, to offer futureBOS youth nofee bank checking accounts. With their own banking accounts, youth can access debit cards, get paid through direct deposit, track their spending, and have complete ownership and control over their finances.

The City's Bank On Boston program is part of a national initiative to alleviate the financial challenges disproportionately felt by lowincome families and youth in Boston and provide them with easy access to financial education and resources. Young people who learn how to manage a bank account responsibly now have a headstart when they enter the workforce as adults.
