Part of the Urban Forest








What are some examples of **GATHERING?**

Active store fronts create hot spots of activity.






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Where are these uses happening along COLUMBIA ROAD?

Safety and Well-being

Feelings of safety and comfort are vital to healthy and vibrant communities. Where spaces along Columbia Road feel too cut off, dark, or invisible, they can feel unsafe. Uneven sidewalks and obstacles in pathways can inhibit movement. Areas of vegetation and defined pathways, can buffer traffic speeds and noise, create spaces to gather, and transform the experience of being on the sidewalk.


















Spatial Structure

The perceived width of Columbia Road changes along its length — sometimes through narrow pinch points where buildings are close to the sidewalk, sometimes a wider corridor with parks and yards on either side. The changes animate its character and are a product of a history of changing patterns of industry, development, infrastructure, and traffic planning.
