Family Food Connections	Boston Children's Hospital's Family Food Connections (FFC) is a food pantry owned and run by Boston Children's Hospital in the Mildred C. Hailey Apartments of the Boston Housing Authority. This food pantry provides fresh fruits, vegetables, milk, eggs, bread, and staple items to families. The pantry is open to everyone in Boston. The primary target is residents and families of the Mildred C. Hailey Apartments and surrounding neighborhoods, as well as BCH patients. Boston Children's Hospital Neighborhood Partnerships	Boston Children's Hospital Neighborhood Partnerships Program (BCHNP) is a school-based behavioral health program that provides clinical care, consultation, professional development, research, and advocacy in partnership with the Boston Public Schools (BPS). In FY23, BCHNP implemented clinical intervention, early intervention, and prevention/promotion services with 1,551 students across five K-8 and high schools. Clinicians intervened in 66 crisis situations with a median wait time of 7 minutes, provided individual therapy to 24 students, and provided care coordination services to 102 students. BCHNP continues to build the capacity of schools to promote the social, emotional, and behavioral health and well-being of students, caregivers, and school staff. In FY23, clinicians provided 456 hours of consultation to teachers, behavioral health providers, and other school staff; 4 workshops with 17 participants; and 11 webinars for 340 social workers from 88 BPS schools. Community Asthma Initiative	The Community Asthma Initiative (CAI) is a comprehensive asthma home visiting program that has helped to improve the health of 2,611 Boston children with asthma since 2005. CAI staff provide case management, conduct home visits, offer education to caregivers and patients, distribute asthma control supplies, connect families to resources, and increase access through advocacy. In FY23, CAI cared for 75 new patients with 58 completing at least one home visit (77%). Boston Children's staff completed a total of 86 visits: 84 were by Community Health Workers and 2 were by the Nurse. Supporting Access to Preventative Pediatric Care for Underserved Populations	Boston Children's Hospital (BCH) has partnerships with 12 Boston community health centers (CHC), 8 of whom are affiliated. Through these partnerships, BCH improves access to care for underserved populations, helps efforts to better manage chronic diseases, and supports prevention and treatment services that improve the health of Boston children, youth, and families. BCH supports its CHC partners with funding, training, technical assistance, and direct services. In FY23, BCH convened its network of 10 CHCs four times to build capacity for weight management through knowledge and resource sharing, including connecting CHCs with local nutrition and physical activity resources. Additionally, BCH provided three Visiting Specialist Rounds for 17 CHC providers looking to build their knowledge of child health topics such as orthopedics, headaches, and adolescent pregnancy. Healthy in the City Operations	Healthy in the City (HIC) uses a community-based approach and case management model to address childhood obesity in Boston. The program is implemented at 10 community health centers. Through capacity building and financial support, HIC enables health centers to administer case management services to children who are overweight or obese and connect their families to culturally appropriate nutrition education and affordable opportunities for physical activity. In FY23, 993 children participated in the program. This work was supported through various capacity building activities including convening 10 health centers quarterly, presenting at provider meetings, knowledge and resource sharing, and workflow improvement. Through these efforts, 59% of program participants decreased their Body Mass Index (BMI) over the year. 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Boston HAPPENS	Boston HAPPENS (HIV Adolescent Provider & Peer Education Network for Services) provides accessible, confidential HIV, STD and Hepatitis screening, risk reduction counseling and supported referrals to adolescents and young adults. They offer HIV medical case management, primary care, HIV specialty care, nutrition care, and HIV risk reduction. Boston HAPPENS serves as a referral resource for school nurses, community pediatric and adolescent practices, and community-based programs. They also provide offsite testing at colleges, alternative schools and youth-focused organizations, mobile medical vans and outreach events. The program trains and supports providers about routine HIV and STD screening, sexual health, nPEP and PrEP, and coordinates care for survivors of sexual assault. Their interdisciplinary youth-focused team offers care, services, case management and support for 30-40 HIV-positive youth annually. In FY23, Boston HAPPENS provided resources to address food insecurity, housing insecurity, and financial instability among young clients with HIV in order to improve medication usage and adherence. Boston HAPPENS maintained outreach programs to provide education on HIV and STI prevention to youth at Bridge Over Troubled Waters, Roxbury Community College, Ostiguy Recovery High School and others. New outreach sites were established at ROCA Chelsea and ROCA Lynn. Workforce Development	<p>Workforce Development Youth and Young Adult Programs:</p> <p>The Workforce Development Youth &amp; Young Adult Programs at Boston Children's Hospital understand the importance of nurturing the next generation of talent. Our youth and young adult programs focus on providing enriching career exploration opportunities for individuals seeking internships and entry-level positions. With a commitment to equity, diversity, and inclusion, we collaborate with community organizations to offer programs tailored to the unique needs and aspirations of young individuals. Through these initiatives, we aim to inspire and empower youth to pursue fulfilling careers in healthcare and beyond.</p> <p>In FY23, the Workforce Development Team offered the following programs:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Aspire Internship Program (MGH): Internship program for adults with high cognitive autism spectrum disorder or a related social profile to gain real-world work experience. Hosted one cohort. 1 intern successfully completed the program.</li> <li>• Building Careers in Health STEM: Offer Annual BCH STEM Week (Building Careers in Health &amp; STEM) in partnership with Office of Health Equity &amp; Inclusion. Program &amp; build a pipeline of diverse, qualified health professionals into Boston Children's. 24 program participants successfully completed the 3-day career exploration program held over winter break.</li> <li>• Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) Earn &amp; Learn Internship Program: A paid internship program that allows students to gain professional experience in their field of study while earning a competitive wage. Hosted 9 interns who successfully completed the program and 1 intern transitioned to a full-time opportunity.</li> <li>• COACH High School and College Internship Program (Communities, Opportunities, and Advancement at Children's Hospital): Provides summer and school year employment opportunities to Boston-area high school students (and college students who are alumni of the high school program). The program allows participants to explore health careers while helping the hospital build a future pipeline of diverse community residents passionate about healthcare careers. Our strong partnership with the Boston Public Schools and the Boston Private Industry Council makes the COACH program possible in addition to many other community-based programs that refer participants. The Workforce Development Team continuously conducts outreach to alumni for job opportunities and connects alumni to recruiters for current job offerings. To date, Boston Children's has hired over 50 former COACH interns into permanent, per diem, temporary and internship positions. In FY23, the team launched an extended summer internship program where interns start their internship experience in April part-time before transitioning into the summer. FY23 marked the 17th year of offering the COACH program with 35 college interns and 69 high school interns.</li> <li>• Cristo Rey High School Work Study Program: High school students work one day a week during the school year in a work-study format to build career skills and exposure. Hosted 2 work study participants and both successfully completed the program.</li> <li>• JVS Transitions to Work (TTW) Internship Program: Boston Children's hosts interns to address the employment opportunity gap facing young adults with disabilities who seek mainstream employment. The internship program provides young people with disabilities an opportunity to gain the skills they need to compete for high demand openings, while building their overall job readiness through workplace readiness training and job placement services. 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	<p><b>Workforce Development Adult Program:</b> Workforce Development at Boston Children's Hospital is dedicated to supporting adult job seekers in the community. Our mission is to connect talented individuals with opportunities within our organization while championing equity, diversity, and inclusion. Through strategic partnerships with community-based organizations, we aim to recruit diverse talent for various job roles, internships, and career exploration opportunities. Once individuals join Boston Children's Hospital, we provide comprehensive support to help them advance in their careers within our enterprise.</p> <p>In FY23, the Workforce Development Team engaged in the following programs:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>African Bridge Network (ABN) Fellowship Program:</b> Fellowship program for adults that provides upskilling and paid work-placement program for foreign-trained professionals in non-clinical positions for participants to gain the needed work experience to access jobs and advance their careers. Hosted one cohort cohort of Fellowship program for skilled immigrants to transition into higher paying jobs. 1 fellow successfully completed the program.</li> <li>• <b>Behavioral Health Workforce Initiative (BHWI):</b> Creates a pipeline for entry-level behavioral health support roles. Hired over 90% of trainees into full-time employment roles.</li> <li>• <b>Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) Medical Interpreter Program:</b> Partnership with BHCC to offer externships to medical interpreting students. Hosted two cohorts of externs.</li> <li>• <b>Community Career Connects Program:</b> Serves as a bridge between community partners, program participants/job seekers, and Boston Children's facilitating a seamless pathway to employment.</li> <li>• <b>Hiring Our Heroes (HOH) Fellowship Program:</b> Fellowship program for transitioning service members. Provides networking, professional training and hands-on experience in the civilian workforce. Fellowship program for transitioning service members hosted 7 and hired 3 across three cohorts.</li> <li>• <b>JVS ARCH Training Program-</b> Training program developed by Boston Children's and JVS to train high intermediate ESOL speakers in the field of animal care in research operations. The program offers free training in contextualized ESOL for the role and on-the-job training. The program pays wages while trainees learn. Upon successful completion, graduates are offered full-time jobs. Hired 90% of graduates in FY23.</li> <li>• <b>JVS Central Sterile Training Program</b> developed by Boston Children's, JVS, and Strive: Trainees attend a 12-week training program which includes 10 hours a week of hands-on training at Boston Children's. Trainees complete required externship hours both during the training program and after graduation. Participants to take the National Certified Registered Central Service Technician exam. Upon successful completion of the program, participants receive personal job placement assistance with their hospital trainee site. Hired 75% of graduates in FY23.</li> <li>• <b>JVS Pharmacy Technician Program:</b> Boston Children's sponsors community members to attend the JVS Pharmacy Tech program at no cost and then hosts trainees for externship hours. City of Boston: Boston Public Health Commission	<p><b>Neighborhood Trauma Team Network (NTTN):</b> The NTTN provides immediate support, therapeutic services, and community engagement in the wake of incidents of violence in Boston. This includes 24/7 stabilization and resource navigation, on-scene response, coping and healing groups, bereavement services, behavioral health services and community engagement. The NTTN has grown to 23 organizations supporting 9 Boston neighborhoods. Boston Children's funds support a Program Manager and resources to build Network capacity, augment resources for resident engagement, and improve public awareness and outreach. In FY23, the NTTN provided trauma support services to 450 residents, including short- and long-term services, continuum of care outreach and support, and healing sessions. NTTN also ran monthly meetings and capacity building support such as workshops, trainings, and protocol information sessions for members of the network.</p> <p><b>Capacity Building and Training Initiative (CBTI):</b> The goal of CBTI is to prevent and address violence by strengthening trauma-informed and equitable approaches among providers and systems serving children, adults and families in Boston. This is accomplished by providing training in workforce development and organizational capacity building. Boston Children's funds support a Training Manager who leads the development and implementation of public training institutes, learning collaboratives, partner workshops, and organizational change activities. Additional funds are used for resources such as a clinical support consultant and a training consultant to provide content-area expertise related to specific projects and stipends to support community partners in informing and/or developing and delivering training content in their organizations and communities. In FY23, 237 service providers participated in 39 training sessions on topics such as trauma-informed and equitable youth work, domestic violence, and racial equity. CBTI also held 4 training institutes totaling 57 hours. 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City of Boston: Boston Public Schools	<p>Boston Community Hub Schools (BCHS): Based on a national community school framework, the BCHS strategy is directly tied to the Boston Public Schools' (BPS) vision of equitable literacy and uses community resources to create an optimal learning environment that allows students to thrive both academically and personally. Boston Children's funding allows BCHS to provide opportunities to build capacity and awareness for culturally and linguistically sustaining and restorative practices, train students in healing and leadership, advance equitable literacy, and offer direct supports and engagements for students and families. In SY23, BCHS served 5,642 students across all 14 hub schools.</p> <p>Comprehensive Behavioral Health Model (CBHM): BPS Department of Behavioral Health Services implements CBHM, a system-wide framework crafted to facilitate the implementation of behavioral health intervention and support strategies. CBHM utilizes universal screening and tiered behavioral health interventions. Boston Children's funding supported the sustainment of CBHM in 78 schools, serving 31,466 BPS students in SY23.</p> <p>Department of Early Childhood: BPS Department of Early Childhood (DEC) used funding to support school readiness among young children prior to Kindergarten entry. For Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK), Boston Children's funding was used to standardize school readiness data collection across all educational settings, including community based organizations, and utilize the BPS K1 report card which tracks data pertaining to social, emotional language and math. Funding also supports Countdown to Kindergarten (C2K), which creates year-round programming to support families within Play to Learn classroom opportunities preparing children for school and amplifying parents as their child's First Teacher. In SY23, C2K engaged more than 140 families in playgroups at the Margarita Muniz School in Jamaica Plain and 30 families in a K-day event co-housed with Tree of Life in Jamaica Plain. C2K also offered 4 workshops to parents.</p> <p>Office of Health &amp; Wellness (OHW): The BPS Office of Health and Wellness leads the district's efforts to implement a Whole Child approach. Boston Children's funding was used to strengthen health and wellness leadership, policies, coordination and resources by building the capacity of school wellness councils; improving school level data collection, evaluation and reporting; utilizing community partners to offer creative solutions to access physical education in high schools; and integrating more physical activity across the school day. BHCCI aims to promote policy, systems, and environmental change strategies in childcare settings to increase the number of childcare programs that provide access to healthy foods, beverages, physical activity, breastfeeding, and to decrease access to screen time. City of Boston: Office of Youth Engagement and Advancement	In FY23, the Mayor's Office of Youth Engagement and Advancement (OYEA) launched a Professional Development Series for youth workers in Boston and used Boston Children's funds to offer 14 trainings for 72 unique individuals.
