


The Statewide Economic and Social Impact of

SOCIAL IMPACTS

Fisher College is the first college in Boston to elevate e-sports to the highest competitive collegiate varsity level to compete against other schools through NECC (National Esports Collegiate Conference), ECAC (East Coast Athletic Conference) and various other competitions. There are over 700 colleges and universities and more than 40,000 student athletes competing between all leagues and conferences.



Association of Independent Colleges and Universities in Massachusetts (AICU Mass) commissioned Econsult Solutions, Inc. (ESI) to conduct an economic impact analysis that covers all 59 AICU Mass member institutions, which represents a snapshot of their annualized economic impacts and broader impact at the present moment.

College 101	College 101 is a program designed to provide college courses for rising seniors in the Boston Public School System. This is a 6-week summer program where students enroll in a 3-credit college course taught by a college instructor and a peer mentor who provides assistance and support. Full access to the College facilities, including library are provided. Students are then offered a free 3-credit class during their senior year, both fall and spring. This program allows the participants to graduate from high school with 9 college credits that can be transferred to the college of their choice.
