

City of Boston Community Benefits Report

Process Summary

The Office of Government and Community Relations at Tufts University collected data on programs, volunteer efforts, donations, and services that faculty, staff, and students provided to the City of Boston and/or its residents during calendar year 2023. This includes financial aid grants for students from Boston that are solely based on need and do not need to be repaid. The data on the following pages is separated by schools and departments. For volunteer service, the dollar value was calculated using the Independent Sector's 2023 valuation (\$31.80/hour). A separate report is submitted to the cities of Medford and Somerville.

Tufts University's benefits contribution to the City of Boston that is calculated in this report is \$17,153,218

The following are not included in the benefits contribution total, but are important to note for Calendar Year 2023.

- Tufts University paid \$32,104 in property taxes to the City of Boston in 2023.
- In FY23, Tufts University paid the City of Boston a \$450,000 PILOT.
- 3,718 Tufts University alumni live in the City of Boston.
- 625 Tufts University employees live in the City of Boston, with a combined salary of \$51,093,191 annually.
