FIND. ALIGN. GENERATE. EVALUATE.

FIND Cities and localities must develop the capacity to rigorously identify, track, analyze, and forecast funding sources and funding needs for services that support children and youth.

ALIGN To address gaps and overlaps in the existing funding landscape, local government must be prepared to make adjustments in how funding is allocated, managed, and accounted for within agencies.

GENERATE Localities must assess need, explore feasibility, facilitate community engagement, launch a campaign, and plan the administration of new locally-generated funds to address gaps in meeting the needs of all children and youth.

EVALUATE As communities do the hard work to find, align and generate new dedicated funding streams for children and youth services, they must also consider methods to measure the impact of their investments.




The Children's Funding Project FIND. ALIGN. GENERATE. EVALUATE.

The Children's Funding Project is structured to:

- Increase understanding of the four funding levers finding funding sources, aligning resources, generating new funding, and evaluating the effectiveness of funding sources.
- Showcase examples of communities that successfully map their resources, blend and braid resources, enact new dedicated funding mechanisms, allocate new resources, and assess their effectiveness.
- Strengthen the capacity of communities to find, align, generate and evaluate their funding by providing training, tools, and coaching.
- **Build momentum** for a new, more pro-active approach to children's funding.



A typical U.S. city:








Investments by Goal






Why now? A window of opportunity.



- The opportunity divide
 Investing 8 to 1 in enrichment from wealthy to poor
- No new federal or state resources
 14% decline in federal spending since 2010
- 3) Prevention and youth development works
 But the lion's share of resources go to fix problems
- 4) Use of evidence takes time, money and stability

 Communities with long term sustainable funding are able to
 - Communities with long term sustainable funding are able to invest in what works
- 5) Collective impact partnerships are ready
 More sophisticated partnerships and backbone organizations to organize and implement
- Voters are willing
 11 of 14 Nov 2016 ballot measures on children's funds passed



Options for Boston to consider:

Property tax increase?

King County, Wash. – Best Starts for Kids

Special fees?

- Soda Tax Philly, Oakland, Berkley
- Entertainment ticket fees Detroit considering

State enabling legislation?

- Florida 8 County Children's Services Councils (special property taxing districts)
- Missouri 9 County Children's Services Councils (sales tax for specific purpose)

Set aside of city budget?

- San Francisco Children's Fund (4% of city property taxes)
- Baltimore Youth Fund (3% of property assessment)

Developer impact fees?

San Francisco and Sacramento for early childhood

Ballot initiatives are hard but the benefits are worth it...

- Expansion of services new populations, neighborhoods, eliminate waiting lists,
- Creativity and flexibility school-based system, ending homelessness, diversion, anchor institutions, youth initiated projects
- System building capacity building, evaluation, coordination, accountability
- Leveraging can double resources, Pay for Success, private sector incentives
- Constituency building community ownership and support 75% vote "yes" for re-authorization
