I'M GOING TO TURN IT OVER TO CHRISTINE PARKS TO MAKE A INTRODUCTION, STATE YOUR NAME AND AFFILIATION FOR THE RECORD, THE FOLKS -- MOST OF THE FOLKS IN THE GALLERY KNOW WHO YOU ARE BUT FOLKS MAYBE WATCHING AT HOME.

>> I'M CHRISTINE PARK, THE DIRECTOR OF THE NEW COMMITTEE ON COMMUNITY PRESERVATION FOR BOSTON.

I'M GOING TO ASK THE CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER TO START AND THEN I'LL TELL YOU A LITTLE BIT ABOUT WHAT WE HAVE IN THE ROOM HERE.

>> THANK YOU, COUNCILOR FLAHERTY AND MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL, I'M THE CHIEF OF ADMINISTRATION OF FNZ AND CFO FOR THE CITY OF BOSTON.

AS YOU ARE AWARE IN NOVEMBER OF 2016 BOSTON ADOPTED THE COMMUNITY PRESERVATION ACT WHICH CREATED THE COMMUNITY PRESERVATION FUND TO SUPPORT PROJECTS IN THE AREAS OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING, HISTORIC PRESERVATION, PARKS AND OPEN SPACE.

THE FUND IS CAPITALIZED PRIMARILY BY A 1% PROPERTY TAX BASED SURCHARGE ON RESIDENTIAL AND BUSINESS PROPERTY TAX BILLS THAT BEGAN IN JULY OF 2017. THE ANF CABINET HAS BEEN CHARGED WITH LEADING IMPLEMENTATION OF THE CPA AND THAT'S DONE UNDER THE LEADERSHIP OF CHRISTINE PARK.

THE PILOT PROGRAM HAS ALLOWED US TO BEGIN FUNDING CRITICAL PROJECTS IN NEIGHBORHOODS ACROSS BOSTON WHICH HAS PROVIDED US WITH THE OPPORTUNITY TO EVALUATE AND IMPROVE THE CPA PROCESS FOR FUTURE FUNDING ROUNDS.

THE CITY IS COMMITTED TO AN OPEN AND TRANSPARENT PROCESS FOR AWARDING CPA FUNDING AND WE BELIEVE THAT IS PRESENTED HEARD IN THIS PIRATE ROUND.

WE'VE CONDUCTED A REVIEW MODELED AFTER THE LESSONS WE LEARNED IN THE BUDGET PROCESS.

THE SAME CRITERIA WAS USED FOR EACH PROJECT TO ENHE SURE THAT IT WAS FAIR AND TRANSPARENT AND INVOLVED MANY CITY DEPARTMENTS IN REVIEWING THESE -- THE APPLICATIONS.

OFFICE OF BUDGET MANAGEMENT, THE PARKS DEPARTMENT, THE DEPARTMENT OF NEIGHBORHOOD DEVELOPMENT ALL CONTRIBUTED THEIR EXPERTISE TO REVIEWING APPLICATIONS, AND HELPED US TO UNDERSTAND WHAT EXACTLY THE PROJECTS WERE AND HOW WE COULD EXECUTE THEM.
WE LOOKED AT PROJECTS THAT LOINED WITH IMAGINE BOSTON 2030 AND DEPARTMENTAL CAPITAL PLANS, ENSURED THAT THEY ARE SHOVEL READY AND WILL NOT SUPPLANT EXISTING DEPARTMENTAL INVESTMENTS.

THE CITY'S DEPARTMENT ALSO REVIEWED PROJECTS TO MAKE SURE THAT THEY MET CPA FUNDING REQUIREMENTS AND AS A RESULT OF THIS REVIEW PROCESS, AND THE CPC'S SUBSEQUENT REVIEW AND RECOMMENDATIONS THE MAYOR IS RECOMMENDING 35 PROJECTS WHICH TOTAL OVER \$8 MILLION OF FUNDING IN THE SPRING PILOT FOUND. THE PROJECTS SPAN ALL THREE AREAS OF ELIGIBILITY, AFFORDABLE HOUSING, HISTORIC PRESERVATION AND PARKS AND OPEN SPACE AND THEY SERVE A VERDICT OF NEEDS AND WILL HAVE A BROAD AND POSITIVE IMPACT ON THE NEIGHBORHOODS ACROSS OUR CITY. I'D LIKE TO THANK THE COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE FOR THEIR WORK, AND THEIR SUPPORT DURING

THIS PILOT PHASE, AND IN
PARTICULAR I'D LIKE TO THANK
CHRISTINE POTTS WHO AGAIN HAS
BEEN LEADING THIS FOR THE CITY,
AND I WILL TURN IT OVER TO HER
TO TALK MORE ABOUT WHAT THE
PILOT ROUND LOOKS LIKE.
>> THANK YOU, EMMA, AND THANK
YOU COUNSELORS FOR DOING THIS
HEARING AND THANK YOU TO

WE JUST HAD A LITTLE PARTY OR CELEBRATION IN THE CURLEY ROOM, AND I ASKED PEOPLE TO BRING THE DISPLAYS THAT THEY BROUGHT SO YOU'LL SEE SOME OF THEM WHEN

EVERYBODY WHO CAME.

PEOPLE ARE SPEAKING.
JUST BECAUSE YOU WEREN'T ABLE TO
TAKE SOME TIME IN THERE.
BUT QUICKLY, AND I ALSO WANTED
TO INTRODUCE MY TWO STAFF
PEOPLE, I HOPE THEY'RE HERE TO

DAVE BROWN AND ALLISON QUINN WHO ARE VERY INVOLVED IN THIS PROCESS.

WITH ME.

WAVE.

QUICKLY, ABOUT THE PILOT, AND THEN I HOPE WE CAN GET INTO TESTIMONY FROM APPLICANTS WHO ARE HERE.

WE GOT A TOTAL OF 58 APPLICATIONS FOR THE PILOT. AND THE REQUEST WAS ABOUT \$14 MILLION.

WE CHOSE AS EMMA DESCRIBED BASED ON THE REQUIREMENTS THAT THE COMMITTEE PUT OUT, SHOVEL READY, A FINAL GAP, MEETING A SIGNIFICANT NEED, AND MAKING A REAL DIFFERENCE IN BOSTON.
THE COMMITTEE CHOSE TO DO THIS PILOT BECAUSE THEY WANTED TO TEST AND REVIEW OUR MATERIALS, AND OUR PROCESS, BEFORE WE'VE GOP INTO A REALLY BIG FUNDING ROUND.

AND THEY WANTED TO START GETTING PROJECTS IN THE GROUND, SO THAT NEIGHBORHOOD RESIDENTS WHO VOTED FOR THE CPA COULD START TO SEE EXCITING THINGS IN THEIR NEIGHBORHOOD.

AND THEY LOOKED A LOT AT, YOU'LL

SEE TONIGHT THAT THE PROJECTS ARE REALLY VARIED.
AND THAT WAS SOMEWHAT PURPOSEFUL, IT WAS BASED ON THE NEEDS THAT PEOPLE PRESENTED, THAT THEY NEEDED SUPPORT FOR FOR THEIR PROJECTS.

BUT ALSO WE WANTED TO SHOW A LOT OF MODEL PROJECTS SO THE COMMUNITY MEMBERS WHO ARE THINKING ABOUT WHAT KIND OF PROJECT THEY MIGHT PROPOSE FOR FUNDING COULD SEE THE WIDE RANGE OF THINGS THAT CPA CAN SUPPORT. AMONG THOSE THAT CAME IN OUR SMALLEST REQUEST WAS FOR \$2,000, AND OUR LARGEST WAS FOR \$500,000, WHICH WAS THE LIMIT THAT THE COMMITTEE PUT ON THIS ROUND OF FUNDING.

WE HAD 20 HISTORIC PRESERVATION PROJECTS, SIX AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROJECTS, 23 OPEN SPACE APPLICATIONS, AND NINE BLENDED. THE COMMITTEE CHOSE TO JUST PRIORITIZE, OR REALLY FOCUS ON ONES THAT TOUCHED TWO CATEGORIES.

SO AN HISTORIC PARK, FOR INSTANCE, OR A PROJECT THAT COVERS BOTH HISTORIC PRESERVATION AND PARKS OR AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND OPEN SPACE.

WE HAD EVENTS THAT WERE NOT FUNDED, MANY WHY NOT ELIGIBLE, THEY WEREN'T SHOVEL READY, THEY WEREN'T FUNDING A GAP, THERE WAS OTHER FUNDING OR THEY WEREN'T REALLY ELIGIBLE UNDER THE STATE LAW.

AND SOME WERE JUST POLICY QUESTIONS THAT THE CITY COUNCIL -- THAT THE COMMITTEE HAD NOT WRESTLED WITH YET. LIKE A COMMUNITY GARDEN THAT'S LOCKED ALL THE TIME. SO THERE ISN'T PUBLIC ACCESS AND CONCERN ABOUT THE STATE ANTI-AID LAW.

SO THAT HELPED US WINNOW THIS PILOT PROGRAM DOWN AND THE COMMITTEE WILL BE WRESTLING WITH SOME OF THOSE SORT OF POLICY

QUESTIONS AS THEY GO FORWARD.
WE HAD ALMOST EVERY SINGLE
NEIGHBORHOOD REPRESENTED, EXCEPT
FOR IN THE FINAL
RECOMMENDATIONS, EXCEPT FOR
MATTAPAN AND CHARLESTOWN WHERE
WE DIDN'T GET APPLICATIONS, BUT
WE ARE WORKING WITH THOSE
COMMUNITIES IN THE HOPES THAT
THAT WILL CHANGE FOR NEXT TIME
AROUND.

AND I THINK THAT'S ENOUGH.
I WILL BE HERE AND WILL BE HAPPY
TO ANSWER MORE PROCESS QUESTIONS
AT THE END, AFTER COMMUNITY
MEMBERS GET TO SPEAK.
THESE ARE BOTH IN THE AUDIENCE
OUR APPLICANTS OF ALL AGES, AS

AND THERE ARE COMMUNITY MEMBERS WHO HAVE JUST BEEN FOLLOWING THIS PROCESS AND CARE AND ARE HERE TO OBSERVE AND SOME OF THEM WOULD LIKE TO MAKE SOME COMMENTS, ALSO, I THINK IN THE TESTIMONY.

AND IF I COULD INTRODUCE SAM TYLER FROM THE FINANCIAL RESOURCE BUREAU.

>> THANK YOU, MR. PRESIDENT --

MR. CHAIRMAN, AND MEMBERS.
MY NAME FOR THE RECORD IS SAM
TYLER, PRESIDENT OF THE BOSTON
MUNICIPAL RESEARCH BUREAU.
WE'RE NOT INVOLVED IN ANY
PROPOSALS, OR MAKING
RECOMMENDATIONS.

OUR ROLE WITH THE CPA REALLY HAS BEEN TO BE SORT OF AN OUTSIDE GROUP THAT WATCHES, AND MEETS. WE ISSUED A REPORT ON THE CPA AND WHAT THAT WOULD MEAN IN TERMS OF ACCEPTANCE, WHAT THE COSTS WOULD BE, WHERE THIS MONEY WOULD COME FROM, AND I THINK THAT WAS HELPFUL JUST BASIC INFORMATION THAT HELPED THE VOTERS IN MAKING THEIR DECISIONS.

WE HAVE FOLLOWED THE PROCESS. WE'LL CONTINUE TO FOLLOW THE PROCESS.

WE ARE PLEASED WITH THE TRANSPARENCY THAT WE HAVE SEEN, BOTH IN TERMS OF THE SELECTION OF THE AT-LARGE MEMBERS THAT IS THE CITY COUNCIL'S RESPONSIBILITY, AND THE FACT -- AND THE WORK THAT, YOU KNOW, THE DIRECTOR UNDERTOOK BEFORE THE CPC WAS ACTUALLY CREATED. IT TOOK AWHILE FOR THE ADMINISTRATION TO FINALIZE ITS DECISION.

SO HAVING THE DIRECTOR BE ABLE TO BEGIN THE WORK I THINK WAS VERY HELPFUL SO THE COMMITTEE WAS ABLE TO MOVE QUICKLY. THIS IS A PILOT ROUND. AND MEANT TO BE QUICK, BECAUSE YOU KNOW AS CHRISTINE SAID, THERE'S -- THE VOTERS HAVE BEEN, AS WELL AS BUSINESSES THAT PAID 62% OF THE TOTAL COST OF CPA. THEY'VE BEEN PAYING FOR AWHILE, IT'S IMPORTANT TO THEM TO SEE THE ADVANTAGES OF THE CPA. SO 19 NEIGHBORHOODS HAVE BEEN --PROJECTS HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED FOR 19 NEIGHBORHOODS, AND AS HAS BEEN SAID THE ONLY TWO THAT WEREN'T IS BECAUSE THERE WASN'T A PROPOSAL SUBMITTED. I THINK THAT, YOU KNOW, THE IDEA OF GETTING IN AND OUT QUICK, SHOVEL READY, CAPS OF \$500,000, IN OUR CALCULATION, AND I'LL EXPLAIN A LITTLE BIT MORE OF THAT LATER, THERE'S THREE OR FOUR AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROJECTS, THAT ARE ABOUT 18%, ALMOST 19% OF THE DOLLARS, THERE'S 16 HISTORIC PRESERVATION PROJECTS, AND 16 OPEN SPACE PROJECTS.

ALL TOTALLING UP A LITTLE OVER \$8 MILLION.

AND THE ONE -- I GUESS THE ONE THING THAT WE DIDN'T EXPECT, AND I'M NOT SURE WE NECESSARILY SUPPORT BUT IT'S THE BLENDED PROJECT IDEA.

I THINK FOR TRANSPARENCY SAKE, I THINK IT'S FRANKLY BETTER TO BE ABLE TO -- YOU CAN HAVE A PROJECT THAT BREAKS UP IN PIECES, BUT HAVE THE DOLLARS AVAILABLE -- WHAT HAS BEEN DONE IN BOTH -- ALL THE BLENDED PROJECTS, THE PURPOSES ARE FOR CPA PURPOSES.

SO THIS IS TOTALLY LEGAL, BUT IT'S GOING REQUIRE THE CITY, CPA, OR CPC TO RECONSTRUCT THE NUMBERS TO BREAK DOWN INTO THE THREE CATEGORIES THAT ARE ALLOWED UNDER THE COMMUNITY PRESERVATION ACT.

THE DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE, DIVISION OF LOCAL SERVICES THAT THE CPC HAS TO REPORT ITS FINDINGS TO, OR ITS ACTIONS TO, DO NOT ACKNOWLEDGE A BLENDED CATEGORY.

AND I WOULD BASICALLY HOPE THAT IN THE FUTURE, THAT THE PROJECTS, EVEN IF THEY'RE BLENDED, THEY'RE BROKEN OUT FOR THE PUBLIC TO KNOW HOW MUCH FOR EACH -- EACH PORTION OF THE BLENDED CATEGORY, OR JUST NOT HAVE A BLENDED CATEGORY, AND, YOU KNOW, JUST PUT THE DOLLARS IN THE THREE ACCOUNTS.

SO THAT YOU KNOW IF YOU'VE GOT -- IF YOU'RE MAKING SURE YOU'VE GOT THE 10% THAT'S ALLOCATED.

HOW MUCH IS GOING TO BE SPENT FROM TEACH OF THOSE.

I THINK THAT WOULD SIMPLIFY AND MAKE IT MORE TRANSPARENT.
BUT ALTOGETHER, I MEAN, I THINK THE PROCESS HAS GONE WELL.
YOU KNOW, THE 35 PROJECTS
REPRESENT A VAST DIFFERENCE OF PURPOSES, BUT ALL THAT WILL IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF LIFE IN THE 19 NEIGHBORHOODS THAT ARE COVERED HERE.

AND I THINK IT'S OFF TO A GOOD START.

I THINK WHAT CPC HAS LEARNED A LOT FROM THIS PROCESS, AND YOU KNOW, THE FACT THAT THERE'S ONLY 18, ALMOST 19% OF THE PROJECTS THAT ARE HOUSING, I THINK THAT'S BECAUSE OF THE NATURE OF THE PILOT PROGRAM.

IT'S MEANT TO BE SHOVEL READY AND NO MORE THAN \$500,000.
AND FROM MY EXPERIENCES BEING A CHAIR OF THE COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE OF MY TIME FOR ELEVEN YEARS, IT TAKES TIME TO BUILD UP THE DOLLARS NECESSARY FOR THE HOUSING PROJECT.

SO I WOULD EXPECT THAT IN THE NEXT ROUND, YOU KNOW, THAT WILL BE A DIFFERENT NUMBER.

BUT, SO ALTOGETHER I THINK A JOB WELL DONE, AND LOOKING FORWARD TO HEARING ABOUT THE PROPOSALS. >> GOOD, THANK YOU VERY MUCH, SAM.

I'M IN POSSESSION OF A LETTER FROM OUR COLLEAGUE WHO WAS HERE, FROM COUNCILOR JACK ZAKIM.
I WAS PRESENT AND HAD INTENDED TO PARTICIPATE IN THE HEARING.
GIVEN THAT THE PREVIOUS HEARING LASTED 40 MINUTES LONGER I HAD TO LEAVE IN ORDER TO ATTEND A PRIOR COMMITMENT.

I'LL REVIEW THE VIDEOTAPE.
I'M EXCITED THAT THE YEARS OF
HARD WORK BY SO MANY, CPA FUNDS
ARE FINALLY BECOMING AVAILABLE
AND PARTICULARLY I'M VERY
PLEASED TO SUPPORT THE VILNA
SHUL AND BEACON HELD AND JOHNSON

BRIDGE ON FENWAY ON THE LIST OF PROJECTS HERE.

MY COLLEAGUES JUST 30 SECONDS AS A PROFESSIONAL COURTESY BECAUSE WE'RE RUNNING SO LATE AND BECAUSE SO MANY FOLKS FROM THE PUBLIC HAVE TAKEN TIME OUT OF THEIR SCHEDULES AND THIS HEARING WAS DELAYED 40 MINUTES, I'LL DEFER IF ANYONE WANTS TO GIVE A 20 SECOND SHOUT-OUT TO A PROJECT IN THEIR DISTRICT, OTHER THAN THAT WE'RE GOING TO CONTINUE TO GET RIGHT INTO IT.

ANYBODY, GREAT?

AWESOME, GREAT.

LET ME BEGIN BY SAYING THANK YOU TO YOU, THE COUNCILORS, AS WELL AS MY COLLEAGUES AND THE DIRECTOR OF THE PROGRAM, CHRISTINE AND OTHERS WHO HAVE MADE SO MUCH EFFORT IN PASSING THIS, AND MAKING IT A REALITY. SO WE ARE DELIGHTED TO BE PART OF THE REALITY TODAY.
SO THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION.

AND THE PROJECT THAT I REPRESENT IS THE CORNER COMFORT STATION. IT'S A VERY UNFORTUNATELY DETERIORATED BUILDING ON UPHAM'S CORNER FROM 1912, PUBLIC REST ROOMS IN THE DAYS WHEN PEOPLE BELIEVED IN THAT YET IT HAS NOT BEEN USED SINCE 1977 AND IT'S BEEN REALLY A DRAIN ON THE NEIGHBORHOOD. WE ARE PROPOSING TO REDEVELOP IT

AS A BICYCLE REPAIR SHOP AND COFFEE SHOP FOR THE NEIGHBORHOOD.

UNDER THE AUSPICES OF A LOCAL ENTREPRENEUR NOAH HICKS DAY MOORE WHO HAS BEEN CULTIVATING THIS FOR MANY YEARS AND REALLY NEEDED A PARTNER TO BE A REAL ESTATE DEVELOPER ESSENTIALLY TO DO THAT AND HISTORIC BOSTON DOES THAT WORK AND IS PUTTING THIS BACK INTO USE FOR THAT PURPOSE. IT IS A \$1.4 MILLION PROJECT. VERY EXPENSIVE FOR WHAT IT IS BUT IT'S ESSENTIALLY A REBUILD OF A BUILDING THAT IS IN VERY TOUGH SHAPE.

TO COMPLETE, AND WE HAVE BEEN
FUND-RAISING INTERNALLY FOR
THAT.

THE RESTORATION WILL HAVE A HUGE IMPACT TO OUR COMMUNITY.
ST. AUGUSTINES IS THE OLDEST

CATHOLIC INSTITUTION IN NEW ENGLAND AND ONE OF THE OLDEST CEMETERIES IN BOSTON.

BECAUSE OF ITS SIGNIFICANCE, THE SOUTH BOSTON NEIGHBORHOOD AND THE CITY OF BOSTON THESE HISTORICAL REPAIRS ARE CENTRAL TO THE LONGEVITY OF THE HISTORIC CHAPEL AND CEMETERY GROUNDS.

IT WILL ENABLE OUR CONGREGATION AND VISITORS TO ENJOY THE CHAPEL AND CEMETERY FOREVER.

THE CEMETERY GROUNDS ARE OPEN DAILY FOR PEOPLE TO VISIT, AND IT'S ALWAYS NICE TO SEE ONE OF THE DESCENDENTS OF MANY OF THE -- THOSE WHO ARE BUIED AT

OUR PROJECT BASICALLY REVOLVES AROUND REPAIRS THAT NEED TO BE DONE, RESTORATION TO THE DOORS, THE WINDOWS, ROOF LEAKS AS WELL AS MASONRY WORK.

ABOUT 2008, WE DID, IN FACT, START A RENOVATION PROJECT, AND THERE WAS SOME ITEMS THAT WE WERE NOT ABLE TO COMPLETE. AND IF YOU LOOK AT THE PICTURE THAT THE REVEREND WAS HOLDING UP, YOU CAN SEE THE --

THE CHURCH.

THE ONLY WAY THAT WE CAN SECURE MANY OF THE DOORS AT OUR CHURCH IS BY PUTTING NAILS IN THEM AND WOOD TO HOLD THEM AND PROTECT THEM.

SO -- TO PROTECT AND KEEP ANYONE FROM ENTERING THE CHURCH. IN ADDITION TO THAT, BECAUSE OF THE WEATHER THAT WE HAVE EXPERIENCED OVER THE PAST YEARS, WE HAVE MANY, MANY ROOF LEAKS THAT WE ARE LOOKING TO GET REPAIRED AND AS FAR AS ELIMINATING THE LEAKS. ONE OF THE ATTRIBUTES OR THE MAIN FOCUS OF ROXBURY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IS THAT IT IS A COMMUNITY CHURCH. AND AS A RESULT OF THAT, A LOT OF NEIGHBORS -- WE HAVE A NEIGHBORHOOD GROUP THAT MEETS AT

AND AS A RESULT OF THAT, WE HAVE

GOTTEN A LOT OF FAVORABLE RESPONSES FROM BOSTON MEDICAL CENTER.

WE HAVE PARTNERED WITH THEM TO MAKE SURE THAT WE ARE ADDRESSING THE PROBLEMS AS FAR AS TRAUMA IS CONCERNED AS A RESULT OF THE MANY UNFORTUNATE INCIDENTS THAT HAVE HAPPENED IN OUR NEIGHBORHOOD.

AND NOT ONLY IN OUR NEIGHBORHOOD BUT IN OUR CITY THAT AFFECTS US AND, AS A RESULT OF THAT, WE HAVE MANY PEOPLE FROM ALL OVER THE CITY THAT COMES INTO OUR CHURCH ON THURSDAYS TO HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO DEAL WITH THE TRAUMA THAT THEY ARE EXPERIENCING.

OUR REQUEST IS FOR \$200,000 FOR THE WESTIN AVENUE GATEWAY RESTORATION PROJECT AND REPAIR

OF THE JOHNSON MEMORIAL GATES LOCATED AT HEMINGWAY STREET IN THE EAST FENWAY NEIGHBORHOOD. THIS IS AN EXAMPLE OF A BLENDED PROJECT, THE JOHNSON GATES WERE BUILT IN 1902 AND NEEDED IMPROVEMENT TO THE PARKLAND AND ITS PATH.

AND WE HAVE AN ORGANIZED PROGRAM TO OPEN THE SANCTUARY TO VISITORS FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD.

LAST YEAR, OUR SANCTUARY RECEIVED OVER 20,000 VISITORS. SO THE -- TO SAY THAT IT'S HEAVILY USED IS AN UNDERSTATEMENT.

SO WHAT IS THE IMPACT FOR US AND FOR THE COMMUNITY?

AND I'M HERE TO ASK FOR YOUR SUPPORT FOR \$500,000 FOR OUR TALBOT COMMONS PHASE 1 PROJECT. THIS IS A 40-UNIT AFFORDABLE RENTAL HOUSING PROJECT LOCATED IN DORCHESTER RIGHT NEAR THE TALBOT "S" STOP ON THE FAIRMONT LINE.

SO WE WILL BE CREATING 20 -- IN 19 NEW UNITS AND RENOVATING 21 EXISTING UNITS IN ABOUT TWO OR THREE LOCATIONS RIGHT NEAR THE COMMUTER RAIL LINE.

ALL OF THE UNITS WILL BE AFFORDABLE TO PEOPLE WHO ARE AT 60% OF AREA MEDIAN INCOME BELOW INCLUDING ALMOST 25% OF THE UNITS WILL BE AFFORDABLE TO VERY LOW INCOME PEOPLE WHO ARE HOMELESS.

SO WE ARE PLEASED TO HAVE GOTTEN THE SUPPORT OF PRESIDENT CAMPBELL AND COUNCILOR PRESSLEY AS WELL AS MICHELLE WU AND WE ALSO HAVE THE SUPPORT OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCIL FOR THIS PROJECT.

MY NAME IS BEN HAVOC.

I WORK FOR HISTORIC NEW ENGLAND AND WE'RE RESPECTFULLY REQUESTING THE FUNDS TO SUPPORT HISTORIC PRESERVATION PROJECT AT THE 1796 OTIS HOUSE.
THE PROJECT WILL CONSERVE ALL 14 WINDOWS ON THE FRONT FACADE AS WELL AS CARRY OUT REPAIRS TO ALL THE WOODWORK AND TRIM ON THE FRONT FACADE AND THEN THE REFAIR OF THE BROWNSTONE STEPS AND IRON RAILING FOR SAFETY ALONG THE FRONT STEPS.
OTIS HOUSE SERVES BOSTON AND THE

OTIS HOUSE SERVES BOSTON AND THE LARGER COMMUNITY IN MULTIPLE WAYS.

IT IS A HOUSE MUSEUM. IT IS A DESTINATION FOR RESEARCHERS USING ORGANIZATION'S LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES, A VENUE FOR BOSTON CHILDREN THIS OUR SCHOOL AND YOUTH EDUCATION PROGRAMS AS WELL AS A SITE 4 PUBLIC PROGRAMS AND A MEETING PLACE FOR COMMUNITY GROUPS. IN ADDITION TO OUR OWN OFFICES BEING THERE SINCE 2015, WE'VE ALSO HOUSE THE OFFICES OF THE BOSTON PRESERVATION ALLIANCE. THE HOUSE MUSEUM TOUR IS OPEN AND FREE OF CHARGE FOR ALL BOSTON RESIDENTS.

AND WE USE THE HOUSE TO TELL THE IMPORTANT STORY OF HOW THE WEST END NEIGHBORHOOD CHANGED BETWEEN THE LATE 18th CENTURY AND THE EARLY 20th CENTURY WHEN WE PURCHASED IT.

THIS WORK WILL HELP ENSURE THE LONG-TERM PRESERVATION OF THIS NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK AND, AGAIN, BRING GREATER PUBLIC ATTENTION TO THE FEW HISTORIC STRUCTURES IN BOSTON'S WEST END NEIGHBORHOOD THAT WERE NOT DEMOLISHED DURING THE CITY'S URBAN RENEWAL EFFORTS IN THE 1950s AND EARLY '60s.

STATE YOUR NAME AND AFFILIATION FOR THE RECORD AND YOU HAVE THE FLOOR.

>> MY NAME IS EDEN LEONARD.
I'M THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR FOR WORLD OCEAN SCHOOL.

WORLD OCEAN SCHOOL IS A PROUD OWNERS ANDÑI OPERATORS OF THE SCHOONER ROWSWAY.

THAT IS A NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK.

SHE WAS BOSTONÑI HARBOR PILOT VESSEL IN THE '40s THROUGH THE '70s ALSO PROTECTED BOSTON HARBOR THE COAST GUARD VESSEL DURING WORLD WAR II.

AND IT WAS THE LAST SAILING VESSEL IN THE UNITED STATES OR IN BOSTON AND GRANTED HER THE HISTORIC DESIGNATION.

IN 2002, THE WORLD OCEAN SCHOOL WAS FOUNDED AND FOUND -- EXCUSE ME.Ñi

ROSEWAY, BOUGHT IT FOR \$10 AND PROCEEDED TO DO A \$1.5 MILLION RESTORATION WITH IT.

ANYTHING WE DIDN'T HAVE TO DO AT THE TIME WE DIDN'T BECAUSE WE WERE EAGER TO WORK WITH STUDENTS AND GET STUDENTS OUT ON THE WATER.

AND SINCE THEN WE'VE HAD 20,000 STUDENTS.

WE OPERATED A BUDGET OF \$1.3 MILLION A YEAR.

GRASSROOTS ORGANIZATION BUILDING THAT AND ONE OF THE ORIGINAL PIECES OF THE VESSEL, HER HORN FILMBER AND RUDDER TRUNK NEEDED TO BE REPLACED AND THE COAST GUARD SAID THAT WE WOULD NOT BE ABLE TO CONTINUE TO OPERATE THE VESSEL IF WE DO NOT REPLACE THIS.

IT'S ABOUT OOH \$500,000 PROJECT AND WE WERE ABLE TO RAISE A CONSIDERABLE AMOUNT BUT THERE IS A DEFICIT AND WE'RE GREATUM IF FOR THE -- GRATEFUL FOR THE OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE THESE FUNDS.

THE INTERESTING THING ACTUALLY WE CURRENTLY DOCK AT THE FEDERAL COURT HOUSE DOCK AND I HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY FOR STUDENTS, ABOUT 600 STUDENTS FROM BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS, LOW INCOME SCHOOLS ARE TARGETED.

ONE OF THE INTERESTING COMMENTS BEFORE THERE WAS NO PROPOSALS FROM MATTAPAN OR CHARLESTOWN, SCHOOLS FROM BOTH OF THOSE AREAS PARTICIPATE IN OUR PROGRAMS EVERY YEAR.

I HAVE A COUPLE OF STUDENTS HERE -- WELL, A STUDENT HERE WITH ME WHO IS ACTUALLY ABOUT TO BECOME ONE OF OUR FIRST BOSTON ALUMNI CREW MEMBERS.

HE'S BECOME A FULL-TIME STAFF MEMBER IN NOVEMBER JOINING US. HE'D LIKE TO SAY A FEW WORDS. >> IT'S A PLEASURE TO SPEAK IN FRONT OF THE COUNCIL TODAY. I GREW UP MUCH LIKE THE EARLIER PRESENTERS FROM EAST BOSTON, PROBABLY STARING OUT OVER THE OCEAN FROM PIERCE PARK AND ONE OF THE THINGS THAT ALWAYS CAUGHT MY EYE ON THE WATER WAS A OLD SCHOONER WITH A BRIGHT RED SAILS.

AND IT WAS THE ONLY SHIP ON THAT HARBOR THAT I WAS REALLY INTERESTED IN.

AND I'D ALWAYS WANTED TO SAIL IT, BUT FOR -- BUT NEVER REALLY THOUGHT I'D EVER GET THE CHANCE. FAST FORWARD A DECADE AND A HALF ABOUT, AND AARON STONE, THE TEACHER AT BOSTON DAY AND EVENING DURING MY FINAL YEAR THERE BEGAN TO PARTNER WITH WORLD OCEAN SCHOOL TO GET A HANDFUL OF STUDENTS OUT AND SALLING FOR THREE WEEKS UP TO NOVA SCOTIA.

IT IS THROUGH THAT EXPERIENCE THAT I REALIZED THAT I WANTED TO GIVE MORE TO BOTH BOSTON DAY AND EVENING AND WORLD OCEAN SCHOOL AND SINCE THEN, I HAVE WORKED AS A TEACHER'S ASSISTANT AT THE SCHOOL.

I GRADUATED FROM BOSTON DAY AND EVENING, HELPING UNDERPRIVILEGED

KIDS FROM COMMUNITIES THROUGHOUT BOSTON THAT WERE JUST GOT SUITED FOR THE NORMAL BOSTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS SYSTEM AND TO WORLD OCEAN SCHOOL, AN ORGANIZATION THAT IS BOTH -- HELPS STUDENTS FROM THE AREA WHO ARE UNDERPRIVILEGED AND NOT ONLY THAT BUT STUDENTS FROM THE CARIBBEAN WHO WERE RECENTLY HIT BY THE HURRICANE THAT SWEPT THROUGH ST. CROU.

AND -- ST. CROIX.

AND IT WOULD BE A PLEASURE TO BE ABLE TO SAIL ON HER FULLY REFURBISHED AND IN PERFECT RUNNING ORDER.

SO MOUNT HOPE HAS AMIDE FOR THE GRANT TO GIVE THE PLACEMENT OF HUNDREDS OF TREES THAT HAVE DIED OVER THE RECENT YEARS IN THE CEMETERY.

IT'S LOCATED IN ROSLINDALE NEAR AMERICAN LEGION HIGHWAY.
THE CITY OWNED 125 ACRE MOUNT HOPE CEMETERY IS A PLACE OF BEAUTY AND TRANQUATE.
IT WAS USED DAILY BY ITS MOUNT HOPE CANTERBURY NEIGHBORS OLD AND YOUNG AS A RECREATIONAL

SPACE.

PATHWAYS RELATE LINED BY MAGNIFICENT, TALL SHADING TREES. SOME SURROUNDING MOUNT HOPE'S POND AND OCCASIONAL WALK OUTCROPPING.

IT WAS ESTABLISHED -- MOUNT HOPE WAS ESTABLISHED IN 1852 AND INCLUDES VETERANS' MEMORIALS, ORNATE, FAMILY PLOOT PLOTS AND -- PLOTS.

IT'S A COLLECTION OF 200,000 INDIVIDUAL MEMORIALS.

IT WAS A PLACE OF A HISTORY AND OF BEAUTY.

TO THE MANY RESIDENTS, HUNDREDS OF RESIDENTS IN THE POCKET NEIGHBORHOOD SURROUNDING MOUNT HOPE, THIS SPACE IS THE CLOSEST WE HAVE TO A PARK.

WE AND OUR NEIGHBORS OFTEN TAKE WALKS TO MOUNT HOPE AFTER WORK AND ON WEEKENDS.

ALL ARE DISMAYED BY THE DECREASING TREE LOSS WE ARE WITNESSING.

OVER THE PAST YEARS, MANY TREES HAVE DIED AND AT INCREASINGLY HIGHER RATE THAN IN PAST YEARS. THIS LAST YEAR, AT LEAST 28 TREES HAVE DIED.

OVER THE PAST 20 YEARS, NOT ONE REPLACEMENT TREE HAS BEEN PLANTED IN MOUNT HOPE CEMETERY. THE PARKS DEPARTMENT IS DOING WHAT IT CAN TO REPLACE THE TREES BUT MORE RESOURCES ARE NEEDED. ONLY THREE NEW INCOME RESTRICTED

SO THIS HOPEFULLY WILL HELP ALLEVIATE SOME OF THAT PRESSURE. WE FIRST COMPLETED A PROJECT AT 200 HANCOCK STREET AROUND THE CORNER.

THECH-UNIT BUILDING ON THE
BOSTON TASK FORCE AND TOGETHER
WITH THE NEIGHBORHOOD, THE
TENANTS, ISD, BPD WORKED TO
TRANS-- BASICALLY REPOSITION THE
BUILDING FOR THE BETTER.

I REPRESENT THE CHINESE ASSOCIATION.

CCDA.

IT IS ONE OF THE OLDEST ORGANIZATIONS IN CHINATOWN THAT HAS WORKED TO SUPPORT IMMIGRANT FAMILIES.

IT WAS FOUNDED THE LATE 1800s. WE ARE HOUSED IN THE OLD QUINCY SCHOOL WHICH WAS BUILT IN 1848. IT WAS A SCHOOL THAT ALWAYS SUPPORTED IMMIGRANT CHILDREN

THAT HAD -- BY THE COMMUNITY. IN THE 1960s, ABOUT 90% OF THE CHILDREN WERE CHINESE ATTENDED THE SCHOOL.

THE BOSTON SCHOOL DEPARTMENT HAD MOVED THE SCHOOL TO A LARGER LOCATION ON WASHINGTON STREET AND SLATED FOR DEMOLITION.

THE COMMUNITY ORGANIZED TO HAVE THE SCHOOL PRESERVED AND TURNED OVER TO THE COMMUNITY TO BE A COMMUNITY CENTER.

THEY DID THAT IN 1983.

AND IT WAS GIVEN TO CCBA.

THEY RENOVATED THE SCHOOL BACK THEN AND TO MAKE IT A VIABLE COMMUNITY CENTER, IT SUPPORTS PEOPLE OF ALL AGES.

WE HAVE AN AFTER-SCHOOL, A TEEN PROGRAM.

IT'S OPEN SEVEN DAYS A WEEK.
WE HAVE HUNDREDS OF PEOPLE THAT
COME TO THE SCHOOL -- TO THE
COMMUNITY CENTER EACH DAY.
WHEN THE ANNOUNCEMENT CAME ABOUT
SHOVEL-READY PROPROJECTS, I RAN.
OUR STAIRS ARE DETERIORATING.
WE HAVE LARGE GAPS AND CRACKS IN
THE STAIRS AND ALSO THE RAMP IS
SEPARATING FROM THE WALL.
THIS IS A PROJECT THAT IS READY

THIS IS A PROJECT THAT IS READY TO GO, AND WE HAD TO BLOCK OFF CERTAIN BECAUSE IT'S DANGEROUS PEOPLE TO WALK AND WE SERVE LARGE POPULATIONS THAT LIVE IN THE COMMUNITY.

THIS IS ALSO PART OF A LARGER PROJECT THAT I'VE BEEN WORKING WITH IN THE COMMUNITY AND THE CHINESE HISTORIC SOCIETY AND WITH THE NATIONAL PARKS SERVICE. THIS BUILDING WAS ACCEPTED INTO THE NATIONAL REGISTRY LAST YEAR. IT IS THE ONLY BUILDING IN THE EAST COAST THAT RECOGNIZES CHINESE IMMIGRANTS AND THE BIGGER PROJECT IS TO MAKE A VISITOR'S CENTER THAT CAN TEACH -- GIVEÑ'Ñ SO I HIGH PRESSURE RIGHT OUT OF

SO I HIGH PRESSURE RIGHT OUT OF THE GATE SORT OF ONE AND TWO OR ONE AND ONE A IS GOING TO BE MATTAPAN AND CHARLESTOWN JUST BASICALLY ACROSS THE BOARD AND I THINK IT'S FAIR TO HAVE A
REPRESENTATION -- A NUMBER
REPRESENTATIVE OF THAT
COMMUNITY'S CONTRIBUTION VIA OF
SURCHARGE.

IF IT'S WRITTEN TESTIMONY, IF IT'S A COMBINATION, LET'S PUT THAT IN WRITING SO IT'S CRYSTAL CLEAR SO THEY'RE NOT MAKING THOSE RULES UP AS WE GO AND WE CAN ALL AGREE TO WHAT THAT LOOKS LIKE, CHRISTINE.

THE SECOND PIECE IS ON AN EQUITY FRONT, I WANT TO APPLAUD YOUR EFFORTS.

THIS HAS BEEN A CONVERSATION FROM THE BEGINNING THAT WE KNEW THAT CERTAIN RESOURCES WERE GOING TO COME FROM CERTAIN PARTS OF THE CITY.

WE ALSO KNEW THAT BUSINESSES, FOR EXAMPLE, WOULD PAY A LOT MORE.

AND WE WELCOME THEIR
PARTICIPATION, EVEN THOUGH THEY
MAY NOT BE GETTING THE BULK OF
THE PROJECTS.

BUT THEY DO GET THE RESOURCES THAT THIS CITY PROVIDES. SO I WANT TO APPLAUD YOU THE COMMITTEE EFFORTS I THINK YOU DID A GREAT JOB THIS FIRST TIME AROUND.

WE'RE FIGURING A LOT OF THIS OUT.

SO I DON'T WANT FOLKS TO BE PENALIZED BUT I AGREE WITH COUNCILOR FLAHERTY, WE WANT TO MAKE SURE FOLKS UNDERSTAND THE MAGNITUDE OF THE RESOURCES THEY'RE GETTING, THE PROCESS. WE HAVE TO BE CRYSTAL CLEAR ON WHAT THAT PROCESS LOOKS LIKE. TWO OTHER THINGS THAT HAS COME UP BUT I DON'T KNOW IF WE'VE ADDRESSED IT.

I WAS EXCITED TO SEE MANY OF THE CHURCHES RECEIVE DOLLARS FOR THE HISTORIC PRESERVATION PIECE THAT CAME UP DURING THE CAMPAIGN WHEN WE WERE CAMPAIGNING FOR CPA.
I ALSO KNOW THAT LOOKING AT OTHER MUNICIPALITIES THERE WAS A QUESTION AROUND WHETHER OR NOT CPA FUNDS COULD BE USED FOR CHURCHES, CHURCHES, I'M NOT SURE TWHAR IS IN THE CONVERSATION.
I DON'T THINK IT SHOULD STOP US BUT I KNOW OTHER MUNICIPALITIES

WERE LOOKING AT POSSIBLY

CHALLENGING THAT.

DO YOU HAVE ANY --

WHAT WE KNOW IS THAT A
NATIONAL ORGANIZATION FOUND A
PLAINTIFF IN AVTON AND THAT-WAS

SUED THE TOWN FOR SUPPORTING A

CHURCH IN AFTON.

THE CPA GRANT WAS FOR TWO THINGS.

IT WAS FOR RESTORATION OF THEIR STAIN GLASS WINDOWS AND ALSO FOR A MASTER PLAN AND A PRFERGS PLAN FOR THE CHURCH.

WHAT THE SJC, THE STATE SUPREME COURT HAS RULED THAT THE SUPPORT FOR THE WINDOWS IS NOT ALLOWED BECAUSE THERE'S RELIGIOUS IMAGERY ON THOSE WINDOWS.

AND THEY HAVE NOT WEIGHED IN YET OR DETERMINED THE MASTER PLAN, THE PRESERVATION PLAN.

WHAT WE DID TO INTERPRET THAT IS THAT WE KNEW -- WE KNOW THAT SO MUCH OF BOSTON'S HISTORY IS IN OUR CHURCHES ACROSS THE CITY IN EVERY NEIGHBORHOOD.

SO WE WE SAID WE ONLY ALLOWED APPLICATIONS -- WE MADE THIS REALLY CLEAR TO THE CHURCHES.

SO WE GOT NO CHURCH APPLICATIONS THAT WERE INELIGIBLE.

WE SAID ONLY EXTERNAL WORK

THAT'S PUBLICLY FACING --

PUBLICLY VISIBLE AND THAT DOES

NOT HAVE ANY RELIGIOUS IMAGERY. SO THAT SEEMED -- IT'S SAFE.

WE COULD MAYBE GO A LITTLE BIT DEEPER AND DO MORE WORK FOR

CHURCHES, BUT THERE WAS PLENTY OF WORK AS YOU HEARD.

THERE WAS CHURCHES AND STEPS AND DOORS AND MASONRY.

>> THIS IS GREAT.

THANK YOU FOR CONTINUING TO FOLLOW IT.

I KNOW I AM AS WELL.

SO THE UPDATE IS HELPFUL TO THE FOLKS WATCHING.

BUT IT'S SOMETHING THAT'S IMPORTANT, AND I KNOW AT LOVE

FOLKS SUPPORTED THE CPA BECAUSE OF THE ROLE THAT THESE HISTORIC SITES PLAY WHEN IT COMES TO THE CITY OF BOSTON'S TOURIST INDUSTRY.

AND SO MUCH MORE.

AND THE PROGRAMMING AND THINGS OF THESE SPACES OFFER.

>> SO WE'RE GOING TO STICK WITH THAT POLICY GOING FORWARD UNTIL THE SJAC WEIGHS IN IN SOME OTHER WAY.

>> LASTLY, NOT TO BE CRITICAL, BUT -- MAYBE I AM BEING CRITICAL.

SO IT WAS GREAT TO HAVE THE STUDENTS HERE AND THE FOLKS FROM THE TWO SCHOOLS FOR THE PLAYGROUNDS.

I WANT US TO JUST BE MINDFUL OF THE LIMITED RESOURCES THAT THE CPA PROVIDES, PARTICULARLY FOR PROJECTS THAT DON'T HAVE A LARGE AMOUNT OF RESOURCES WITHIN THE CITY OF BOSTON'S BUDGET. SO, FOR EXAMPLE, THE HOUSING PROJECTS, IT'S OFTEN DIFFICULT FOR THE DEVELOPERS OR THOSE FOLKS TO GET FUNDING FROM D&D. SOME OF THE HISTORIC PRESERVATION PROJECTS OBVIOUSLY WHEREAS WITH THE SCHOOL BUDGET, WE HAVE A VERY LARGE SCHOOL BUDGET, OVER \$1 BILLION. I'D LIKE TO THINK THAT THERE'S ROOM WITHIN THAT BUDGET OR THERE SHOULD BE ROOM WITHIN THAT BUDGET TO MAKE SURE EVERY SCHOOL HAS A PLAY GROURND. IT'S UNACCEPTABLE THAT THE OLDEST DID NOT HAVE A MAYGROUND AND HAD HAD TO WAIT FOR CPA FUNDS FOR A PLAYGROUND. THE BUDGOATE IS -- I WANT US --I WANT TO NOTE THIS IN THE COMMITTEE REPORT IN SOME WAY THAT WE REALLY WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT THESE PROJECTS AND THIS IS FOR THE COMMITTEE TO BRING BACK TO THE COMMITTEE ARE REALLY LOOKING AT THOSE PROJECTS THAT DON'T HAVE MUCH -- HAVE ACCESS TO MUCH FUNDING IN THE CITY OF

BOSTON'S BUDGET WHERE SOME

OTHERS HAVE AT LEAST A CLAIM TO SCHOOL FUNDING WHICH IS THE BIGGEST PIECE OF OUR BUDGET.
AND I'D LIKE TO THINK THERE ARE RESOURCES IN THAT BUDGET FOR SOME OF THESE CAPITAL PROJECTS WHERE SOME OF THE HIS TOUR ISPRESERVATION, THE HOUSING PROJECTS, THAT DOESN'T NO EXIST OR IT'S VERY, VERY LIMITED.

COMMISSIONER COOK AND THE PARKS DEPARTMENT, VERY LIMITED BUDGET WHEN YOU LOOK AT THE AMOUNT OF GREEN SPACE AND PARKS THAT THEY HAVE TO MAINTAIN OVER A PERIOD OF TIME.

SO I JUST WANTED TO FLAG THAT. AND I ALSO HEARD FROM SOME CONSTITUENTS WHO LOOK AT THIS, WHO FOLLOW THESE PROJECTS, AND WHO ALSO FLAGGED THAT AS A CONCERN.

SO I WANTED TO NAG THAT FOR YOU AND -- FLAG THAT FOR YOU AND THE COMMITTEE.

I ALSO WANT TO THANK CHRISTINE AND KERRY FOR STAYING LATE AND FOR YOUR WORK.
