men and women of the Boston 13:10:52:18
police department, our trauma 13:10:53:24
centers, Boston center for youth 13:10:55:03
and families, all the relevant 13:10:56:15
stakeholders, and most 13:10:58:00
importantly hear from the 13:10:59:06
members at large, hear from the 13:11:00:06
public about some of their 13:11:01:18
concerns. 13:11:02:21
We have already seen some 13:11:03:15
incidents happen. 13:11:05:12
On may 4 there was a double 13:11:07:03
homicide within my district at 13:11:08:18
the Mildred Haley apartments. 13:11:09:24
There were two victims, 13:11:11:15
Christopher Joyce and Clayborn 13:11:13:00
Blair. 13:11:13:27

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and it's obviously devastating 13:11:15:27
and incredibly traumatic to the 13:11:17:12
community. 13:11:19:00
We will hear from some of my 13:11:19:15
friends from Mildred Haley a 13:11:21:03
little later. 13:11:26:15
There was a quadruple shooting 13:11:27:15
in Roxbury as recently as this 13:11:28:21
weekend. 13:11:31:09
We know while we are a 13:11:31:18
relatively safe city, obviously 13:11:33:15
one crime, one major crime that 13:11:35:03
is committed is going to have 13:11:36:24
profound impact, so we want to 13:11:38:03
make sure that we have the 13:11:40:00
resources, we have the tools, 13:11:41:06
and we have the plan going 13:11:43:00

we're seeing so far this year, 13:16:38:15
what we're seeing in past 13:16:41:12
summers, and the strategy that 13:16:42:24
we are taking. 13:16:48:06
I know mayor Walsh early in may, 13:16:49:00
first week of may, we had a 13:16:52:00
violence meeting on summer 13:16:54:00
strategy, and we had all the 13:16:56:03
parted -- partners in the room 13:16:57:21
talking about what we all can do 13:17:01:00
to make this a safer summer. 13:17:02:06
I thought that meeting went very 13:17:04:00
well. 13:17:05:06
and here we are, and we're into 13:17:06:15
the summertime. 13:17:09:09
Clearly last weekend was a busy 13:17:11:21
weekend. 13:17:13:15
I think we had seven people 13:17:13:27
shot. 13:17:16:12
Obviously, councilor, obviously 13:17:18:21
I'm sorry what happened on your 13:17:20:24
street. 13:17:22:15
Four young kids getting shot on 13:17:23:18
a street is not something I like 13:17:25:18
to be woken up to, as well as 13:17:27:06
I'm sure you were quickly 13:17:28:18
texting me when you heard the 13:17:32:27
shots. 13:17:35:15
That's the type of stuff we have 13:17:35:21
the all work together so it's 13:17:37:03
not happening on our streets 13:17:38:24
during the summer. 13:17:40:03
At least I hope making that 13:17:41:00
arrest will help calm things 13:17:42:21
down. 13:17:44:15

We're working on some strategies 13:17:45:18
in and around your neighborhood 13:17:47:03
right now, and hopefully that 13:17:48:18
will help. 13:17:50:09
But to start out, I have Jan 13:17:50:27
Gillis here, who is going to 13:17:54:06
give you a snapshot of how 13:17:56:09
summers have impacted the 13:17:58:24
violence and give you an idea of 13:18:00:00
how it's been from the beginning 13:18:01:24
of this year until now and how 13:18:04:03
we're going to need everybody's 13:18:05:24
help to make this summer safe 13:18:07:03
one. 13:18:11:15
So if you want to walk us 13:18:14:15
through. 13:18:16:15
>> Quickly I want to set a 13:18:16:24
baseline for what we've seen in 13:18:18:09
past summers based on statistics 13:18:20:00
and locations of violence. 13:18:22:03
There you go. 13:18:23:15
When we talk about summer 13:18:31:24
violence, statistically we're 13:18:32:27
talking June 1-August 31 for 13:18:34:27
that year. 13:18:37:24
So a lot of these months are 13:18:42:24
comprised of that full time 13:18:44:06
frame going back to 2013. 13:18:46:09
You can see homicides range 13:18:48:15
between 13. 13:18:50:00
Last year we had a slight uptick 13:18:51:12
with 18 homicides during the 13:18:53:00
summer months. 13:18:54:06
Other part one crime categories 13:18:55:00
over the summer last 13:18:59:06
year actually decreased. 13:19:00:21
Overall we average 1,000 to 13:19:02:03
1,500 violent crimes, part one, 13:19:04:03
over the summer months. 13:19:09:00
Shooting victims for the same 13:19:10:06
three-month period going back to 13:19:11:15
2007, so almost a ten-year 13:19:13:18
block, over the summer we 13:19:15:21
average 95 victims for that 13:19:17:12
three-month period. 13:19:19:06
That averages out to one victim 13:19:20:06
a day when you're looking at 13:19:21:27
those three months. 13:19:23:12
Last year we were under that 13:19:24:12
average with 89 victims for the 13:19:25:27
summer months. 13:19:28:03
You can see going back to 2007, 13:19:28:27
2008, 2011 we were over that 13:19:31:12
threshold. 13:19:33:27

The last couple years has 13:19:34:21
fluctuated between 84 up to 95 13:19:35:24
victims. 13:19:39:09
So that's kind of the baseline 13:19:40:09
that we've seen in the city in 13:19:41:27
past years. 13:19:43:12
When you compare fatal shootings 13:19:44:09
versus non-fatal shootings, we 13:19:47:27
pretty much average between ten 13:19:49:24
and 15 fatal shooting victims 13:19:52:00
for those summer months. 13:19:54:09
Last year that was a bigger 13:19:56:00
percentage of those shooting 13:19:57:15
victims. 13:19:58:27
The three previous years we had 13:19:59:09
ten each summer. 13:20:01:00
2011 was a very active summer, 13:20:04:00
24 fatal shooting victims in the 13:20:06:27
three-month period. 13:20:08:18
Those are the numbers we've seen 13:20:09:18
in the past again. 13:20:11:12
a lot of this is dependent on 13:20:12:06
which feuds and groups are 13:20:13:18
active at the time and what the 13:20:15:09
dynamic is in some of the more 13:20:16:24
active neighborhoods. 13:20:18:15
As far as non-fatal shootings, 13:20:19:18
just last year compared to the 13:20:22:09
previous year, we were up 9% in 13:20:24:15
fatal shootings and 50% in 13:20:26:21
non-fatal -- or 50% in fatal and 13:20:29:18
9% in non-fatal shootings. 13:20:33:06
So not big number changes there, 13:20:35:06
only five and six incidents 13:20:37:03
respectively, 11 overall. 13:20:39:18
So pretty stable numbers that 13:20:41:12
we've seen in past years. 13:20:42:27
When you look at when the crime 13:20:45:03
is happening, most of it occurs 13:20:47:12
in the 4:00 until 11:00 p.m. 13:20:52:24
shift. 13:20:55:00
the majority of the activity. 13:20:55:09
When you look at the days of 13:20:57:00
weeks, Sunday nights and Monday 13:20:58:15
nights were very active last 13:21:00:00
summer. 13:21:01:12
A lot of the activity is after 13:21:01:27
bars and clubs let out and 13:21:04:24
around late-night party 13:21:06:06
activity, so in those early 13:21:07:09
morning hours between 10:00 p.m. 13:21:08:21
until 2:00 a.m. the next morning 13:21:11:18
on the weekends, but more toward 13:21:13:15
the end of the weekend, Sundays 13:21:14:24

and Mondays tend to be more active. 13:21:16:03
 13:21:17:27
 Holiday weekends are also a concern. 13:21:18:12
 13:21:21:00
 In the past we have had significant activity around 13:21:22:06
 13:21:23:09
 Fourth of July holiday weekend. 13:21:24:27
 Last year in particular we had 16 people shot in ten incidents 13:21:27:00
 13:21:28:24
 during the Fourth of July weekend, that's Friday through 13:21:31:15
 13:21:33:03
 Monday, which is one of the most active years that we've had. 13:21:34:15
 13:21:35:24
 Other holiday, memorial day and Caribbean fest weekend tend to 13:21:37:18
 13:21:39:21
 be active wedges, though last year and in recent years they 13:21:40:27
 13:21:43:00
 haven't been as active. 13:21:44:18
 Looking back to 2011, 2010, 13:21:46:12
 those were our more active time frames surrounding those 13:21:49:24
 13:21:51:12
 holidays. 13:21:52:12
 and again, a lot of that 13:21:53:06
 violence, a lot of the weekends 13:21:54:15
 with large victim counts are 13:21:56:00
 usually parties, people in close 13:21:57:24
 groups, and that's when we get 13:22:00:15
 the multiple victim shootings in 13:22:02:09
 those high counts for weekend 13:22:03:21
 violence. 13:22:05:00
 So that's kind of what we've 13:22:05:15
 seen in the past there. 13:22:07:18
 As far as where the violence is 13:22:09:03
 happening, these are the hot 13:22:11:27
 spots for last summer. 13:22:13:09
 I know this is hard to see, but 13:22:14:12
 pretty much starting in the 13:22:16:03
 south end, hitting a couple 13:22:17:09
 neighborhoods in Roxbury, 13:22:20:00
 Bromley-Heath, J.P., down into 13:22:21:18
 Dorchester, up in the corner 13:22:25:27
 area and a few areas down into 13:22:28:00
 lower Dorchester and Mattapan, 13:22:30:06
 Franklin field included. 13:22:32:15
 That's where the violence was 13:22:34:12
 last summer. 13:22:35:18
 a lot of these are historical 13:22:36:09
 hot spots that we've been 13:22:38:00
 talking about for a very 13:22:39:06
 long-time. 13:22:40:03
 But they all kind of have active 13:22:41:00
 groups and dynamics going on in 13:22:43:06
 those neighborhoods, as well. 13:22:45:03
 As far as where we are this 13:22:46:09

year, we're down 16 shooting 13:22:48:27
victims and down 15 shooting 13:22:51:06
incidents compared to the same 13:22:52:24
time frame last year. 13:22:54:03
We are up in shooting homicides 13:22:55:18
slightly, but all other 13:23:02:00
categories are down. 13:23:03:18
They're right near our five-year 13:23:04:21
average. 13:23:07:24
The average number of shooting 13:23:08:12
victims at this point in the 13:23:09:24
year going back five years is 13:23:10:24
86. 13:23:12:00
So we're slightly below that, as 13:23:12:15
well. 13:23:14:27
Kind of looking at 13:23:15:06
month-over-month trend, we're at 13:23:16:03
13 victims so far in June of 13:23:18:24
this year. 13:23:20:09
an interesting note about this 13:23:21:24
year is we had a very active 13:23:23:00
December, which is not 13:23:24:24
characteristic. 13:23:25:24
Usually winter months are a lot 13:23:26:24
quieter, and activity kind of 13:23:28:21
dropped off and we're just 13:23:30:21
starting to see that pick up in 13:23:32:12
the last couple weeks. 13:23:33:15
So not every year looks the 13:23:34:27
same. 13:23:37:06
Usually June, July, August have 13:23:37:18
the large spikes, but this year 13:23:39:09
has been more consistent across 13:23:41:18
the board. 13:23:43:00
with that I'll turn it back over 13:23:43:18
to the commissioner. 13:23:46:06

You can see by these numbers, 13:23:52:18
you know, obviously we really do 13:23:55:06
prepare for the summer and by 13:24:00:24
the locations. 13:24:02:09
That's where we put most of our 13:24:03:15
resources. 13:24:06:00
So when you look at those hot 13:24:06:27
spots, we had a crime meeting 13:24:08:12
this morning with all our staff 13:24:09:24
and all our captains. 13:24:12:03
We focused on -- and we do this 13:24:13:15
every Wednesday, and we do it 13:24:16:15
every two weeks -- where our 13:24:18:12
resources have to be. 13:24:22:06
Jen Gillis and the intelligence, 13:24:23:12
that's what they do. 13:24:25:03
They supply us this information, 13:24:26:03

and that's how we deploy to stop 13:24:27:27
the violence. 13:24:30:03
You know what, you clearly see 13:24:31:27
there is the summer we pick up. 13:24:33:12
You know, when the mayor had his 13:24:36:03
meeting a month ago, I laid out 13:24:39:15
a lot of our plans, and a lot 13:24:42:03
has to do with the partnership, 13:24:43:27
both working with the trauma 13:24:47:00
team here, as well as all our 13:24:48:12
community partners. 13:24:52:03
Over the last couple weeks, I 13:24:53:09
met with Josh Kraft and all the 13:24:54:27
directors of all the boys and 13:24:57:18
girls clubs, working with them 13:24:59:06
in our offices to get these kids 13:25:00:27
into camps and get them into 13:25:03:06
programs in the summer and keep 13:25:05:15
them busy. 13:25:07:00
and I met with James Morton from 13:25:08:00
ymca similar. 13:25:10:15
They offer free camps to 13:25:12:21
every -- I'm sorry, free 13:25:14:21
memberships to every kid in the 13:25:17:12
city all throughout the summer. 13:25:19:00
They have a lot of great summer 13:25:20:12
camps that we're trying to get 13:25:21:27
local kids who really need them. 13:25:23:15
Especially around the 13:25:25:12
developments into those camps. 13:25:26:03
We work closely with them. 13:25:27:21
Honestly, we do the team police 13:25:30:27
academies. 13:25:33:03
We do the junior police 13:25:34:03
academies. 13:25:35:06
We do quite a bit to try to keep 13:25:36:06
the kids busy and keep them 13:25:38:00
focused on positive things to 13:25:40:12
keep them away from the guns. 13:25:42:03
You were close to getting 300 13:25:44:18
guns off the street. 13:25:48:06
I've always said, there's way 13:25:48:27
too many guns on the street. 13:25:50:15
That's what keeps me awake. 13:25:51:27
I know the mayor is very 13:25:53:12

We were out there trying the walk with the community. We have 30 new bikes this will be deployed in all the district stations. We have the bike unit, but we're going to have three additional bikes in every station to put out, which will be helpful, so we're doing a lot of good visibility out there. We're involved in all the kids' camps, all the kids' programs. We're continuing out there trying to make a difference. What we need honestly is the community's help to make this a safe summer. You know, I don't know what else we can do. We need everyone in this city to step up and help us, because obviously these kids are getting guns younger and younger, and, you know, we see them using them. So I don't know how we are the only solution on that. I'm glad to see a lot of community members here, because this is a comprehensive... it has to be a comprehensive approach, because, you know, we're trying our hardest, believe me, but we're facing the

I am the director of trauma response and recovery at the Boston public health commission. Thank you chairman McCarthy, and also thank you to councilors Janey and O'Malley for filing the order and having us here today.

In my role I manage the neighborhood trauma teams or ntt. to help coordinate services for individuals, families, friends, community impacted by community violence. the work also focuses on the critical aspects of recovery. Boston is actually fortunate to have a tremendous group of partners that are committed to addressing the root causes of violence through a public health approach, especially those who are seated here with me at this table.

Additionally, healthcare community understands the need to provide strong trauma support and services to victims. Our schools understand the value of teaching children skills to foster social and emotional wellness.

Community based organizations understand how they contribute to building trust and cohesion in our neighborhoods. Most importantly, our residents are eager to engage inner -- in every aspect of building peace in the City of Boston. Based on information gathered from 14 community sessions in the summer of 2016, the health commission designed a program to support a network of city-wide and neighborhood-based trauma response and recovery services. That's the program we called the Boston neighborhood trauma team network. Trauma teams link community health centers with community-based organizations in

In the last couple years we have had special emphasis to make sure we include homeless youth who sometimes don't get access to these services, and we have the thank partnerships with associate grant makers who continue to provide scholarship dollars to serve the population, but also to connected us with the organizations that are serving the youth families to make sure that they realize that these programs are available to them.

We also have the Boston summer funstop, bcf fun stop for youth between 8 and 14 who are not actively involved or enrolled in a traditional summer camp program.

the program is structured for youth who are sort of kind of lost, meaning that parents can't afford sometimes the cost or sometimes they just don't need to care for the full day. They just need a place for the kids to stop and be part of it. All of these programs take place in our community centers outside of adjacent parks and fields. Bcys fun stops operate Monday through Friday on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Each of us serve up to 50 young individuals.

One of the things that we learned, especially as we were doing our round Robin is we continue to hear this particular theme about the girls. Sometimes when we think about violence, we just focus on the males, but sometimes we forget that young women will get caught up in that world not intentionally.

Sometimes it's just that, you know, boy crazy or whatever the situation may be, they get caught up to something they might not be right for them, and one of the things we have is our

It can fire a lot of rounds in a very short period. It is what was used in the parkland shooting last month or two months ago. So that's a concern because while we have pretty strict I would hope they would be more strict gun laws in the Commonwealth, they don't have them in Maine or New Hampshire or Vermont. So have you seen an increase in sort of the military-style assault weapons on our streets? Was that an anomaly to find an AR-15? >> Well, year-to-date, we haven't seen a whole lot more, thank God. You know, I think there is a ban on assault rifles here, so we haven't seen, knock on wood, a whole lot. But it troubles me that we're seeing so many high-powered semi-automatic handguns in the hands of a lot of young kids out there. Even in this search, it bothers me when we find these two guns they're in piles of laundry already caulked. Luckily my officers weren't shot. Those were ready to go off on anyone who found them. They were set up in the clothes. Thank God they weren't hurt early this morning when they
