AS WELL AS DOCKETS 0626, 2628, CAPITAL BUDGET PROARPGS, INCLUDING LOAN ORDERS AND LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENTS. I WOULD LIKE TO REMIND FOLKS IN THE CHAMBER THERE IS A PUBLIC HEARING.

I AM JOINED HERE BY ANN CAR GO NAAH OUR BUDGET DIRECTOR, MIKE BROAL, OUR SUPERINTENDENT -- OUR CITY ENGINEER AND KATIE -- OUR CHIEF ENGINEER. THIS IS RECOMMENDED PUBLIC WORKS BUDGET IS \$95.5 MILLION,

BUDGET IS \$95.5 MILLION, ROUGHLY 10 PARTICIPANT INCREASE OVER FY 19.

AND THAT FUNDING SUPPORT ROUGHLY 390 STAFF PEOPLE TO DELIVER ON TWO KEY MISSIONS FOR THE MAYOR. FIRST TO DELIVER BASIC CITY SERVICES AND STONED DESIGN AND CONSTRUCT GREAT STREETS. I WILL

WALK THROUGH BRIEFLY SOME OF THE THINGS WE DID IN FY 19, SOME OF OUR GOALS FOR FY 20 AND SOME OF THE NEW INVESTMENTS IN FY-20. STARTING WITH SOMETHING WHICH IS

CORE TO OUR WORK WHICH IS SNOW.

READ BY -- WE HAD ANOTHER

SUCCESSFUL WINTER, LAST WINTER WE GOT A LITTLE OVER THREE FEET OF SNOW IN THE CITY OF BOSTON.

IT IS -- IT WAS A WINTER WHICH WAS VERY SHORT ON MAJOR MEGA SNOWSTORMS.

I THINK HE WE ONLY HAD ONE

SNOWSTORM ABOVE A FOOT, A STORM ON MARCH 5TH, AND WE, I AM GLAD WE DID NOT HAVE HUGE MANY OF THE

HUGE NEGATIVE GA SNOWSTORMS THAT

GAVE RISE TO A PRESS CONFERENCE.

WE HAS DOZENS OF EARLY MORNING SNOW. ICE OR MIXED PRECIPITATION

EVENTS AND BECAUSE OF THE

INCREDIBLE ATTENTIVENESS AND

GOOD PLANS OF MIKE BROLE --

DARLING WILLIAMS AND THEIR TEAM,

THOSE EVENTS LARGELY WENT

UNNOTICED TO THE MORNING

COMMUTERS BECAUSE WE HAD DONE A

GOOD JOB THROUGHOUT THE EARLY

MORNING HOURS TO MAKE SURE THE

STREETS ARE SAFE.

OUR EXPECTED SNOW BUDGET FOR FY-20 IS AROUND \$24.8 MILLION, A SLIGHT INCREASE OVER THE PREVIOUS FISCAL YEAR.

IN ADDITION TO ALL THE WORK WE DO AROUND SNOW IN THE WINTER OBVIOUSLY WE FOCUS ON KEEPING OUR STREETS CLEAN ALL

YEAR-ROUND.

LAST YEAR ONE OF THE THINGS MIKE PRESENTED ON BECAUSE PLAN TO BRING SOME MORE OF OUR HOUSECLEANING SERVICES IN HOUSE. THAT'S A SERVICE THAT IS LARGELY CONTRACTED OUT BECAUSE OF THAT WORK WE SAVED AROUND \$148,000 BY **BRINGING MORE OF THOSE SERVICES** IN HOUSE AND CONTINUING TO DELIVER EXCEPTIONAL CITY SERVICES ACROSS THE ENTIRE CITY. THIS BUDGET INCLUDES AN EXPANSION OF THE HIGHWAY BUDGET BY AROUND \$800,000 TO REALLY HELP UP DO MORE STREET CLEANING AND MAINTENANCE IN SOME OF THOSE AREAS WHICH OUR CURRENT PRACTICES MAKE MUCH HARDER TO CLEAN. WE ARE CHANGING OUR CITY STREETS WITH THINGS LIKE CYCLE TRACKS IN THE NORTH END, LIKE TEMPORARY POP-UP PLAZAS LIKE COUNCILOR MCCARTHY VISITED THIS PAST WEEKEND ON BERK STREET AND ROSLINDALE. AND OTHER SORT OF IMPROVEMENTS ACROSS THE ENTIRE CITY. WE NEED INVEST MORE IN OUR HIGHWAY DIVISION TO MAKE SURE THEY HAVE GOT PERSONNEL AND THE TOOLS THEY NEED TO BE ABLE TO ACTUALLY KEEP THOSE SPACES WELL MAINTAINED AFTER THEY ARE INSTALLED. IN ADDITION TO THAT WORK, AS FOLKS KNOW, MAYOR PUT A LOT OF ATTENTION ON -- EVERY SINGLE DAY MULTIPLE TIMES A DAY PUBLIC WORKS IS OUT THERE IN THE AREAS AROUND THAT BUDGET ALSO INCLUDES A \$50,000 CONTRACT TO INCREASE -- INCREASE SERVICES AROUND THE CORRIDOR, IN ADDITION TO \$150,000 FOR OUR HIGHWAY TEAM TO BE ABLE TO MAINTAIN GREET INFRASTRUCTURE ACROSS THE CITY TO BUILD UP SOME OF THE THINGS WE ARE INSTALLING IN CITY STREETS LIKE MORE PERMEABLE SERVICES. AROUND STREET CLEANING AND JUST

KEEPING OUR STREETS FREE AND CLEAR OF SNOW AND LOOKING

BEAUTIFUL, OUR STREET LETTING DIVISION IS ANOTHER PLACE WE ARE ADDING ADDITIONAL INVESTMENT OVER THE COURSE OF THIS YEAR. LED BY JOHN YET MAN AND MIKE DON DWI.

WE ARE INCREASING OUR INVESTMENT IN SOME KEY AREAS THANKS TO THE ADEQUACY OF COUNCILOR FLYNN AND PUTTING \$650,000 INTO THE STREET LETTING BUDGET TO BE ABLE TO DO A STUDY TO LOOK AT HOW WE CAN REDUCE INCIDENTS OF STRAY VOLTAGE IN OUR CITY. ALSO PUTTING A RIDDLE TOWARDS LED RETROFITS, SWAPPING OLD LIGHTING FIXTURES WITH LED FIXTURES TO RETROFIT ABOUT 1,300 STREETS ACROSS THE CITY AND UP GRADE STREETLIGHTS IN PARS OF OUR CITY WHERE THE LIGHTING HAS BECOME OUTDATED. I MENTION ALL OF THE STREETLIGHTING WORK. OUR CENTRAL DIVISION LED BY KAUFMAN AN BRADLEY WHO ARE HERE TODAY ARE DOING THEIR GREAT WORK KEEPING THE STREETS UP AND

KEEPING THE STREETS UP AND RUNNING INCLUDING OUR EX-, ADDING FOUR NEW ELECTRIC VEHICLES TO THE FLEET, CITY WIDE VEHICLE FLEET SHARING SYSTEM, UNDER MATT'S WORK WE HAVE DONE A LOT TO ACTUALLY IMPROVE THAT WHICH WE TRACK AND MANAGE OUR FLEET THROUGH IMPROVED GUILTY PLEAS PROVIDERS AND WE ARE ALSO, GPS PROVIDERS.

AND COMING YEAR WITH .. PARTNER
-- TO THINK HOW WE CAN
INSTRUMENT OUR VEHICLES TO MAKE
DRIVING ON CITY STREETS EASIER
FOR FOLKS WHO ARE BEHIND THE
WHEEL AND TO REDUCE CRASHES.
THIS IS ALL ABOUT WORK
OBVIOUSLY, THE BIG CHANGE WITHIN
THE PUBLIC WORKS BUDGET WAS
GHEAL THE WASTE REDUCTION
DIVISION.

WE EXPECT THAT OF THAT \$9.5 MILLION INCREASE ALMOST \$8 MILLION OF THAT, AT LEAST \$6 MILLION OF THAT IS BECAUSE OF ADJUSTMENTS IN WASTE REDUCTION, AS FOLKS KNOW, THE PUBLIC WORKS TEAM HANDLES 240,000 TONS OF WASTE GENERATED IN HOUSEHOLDS ACROSS THE CITY OF BOSTON AND HAVE TRASH, RECYCLES, ALL OF THE CONTRACTS FOR THOSE SERVICES EXPIRE ON JUNE 30TH OF THIS YEAR SO THEY ARE ALL BEING WORKED THROUGH AND WE HAVE NOT FINALIZED ALL OF THE CONTRACTS AND DON'T HAVE NECESSARILY SPECIFIC NUMBERS AND ALL LOOKING AT A SIGNIFICANT INCREASE ACROSS ALL FOUR OF THOSE CONTRACTS, COLLECTIONS, RECYCLING, TRASH, THAT WORK, WE THINK WE ARE IN A FOOD POSITION FOR THE YEAR AHEAD, LARGELY BECAUSE OF THE LEADERSHIP OF OUR SUPERINTENDENT WASTE REDUCTION BRAIN KAUFMAN WHOSE TEEN, ROACH, GORMAN, WHO ARE ALL HERE TODAY, REALLY HAVE A FOCUS ON HOW WE CAN USE THOSE CONTRACTS TO ACTUALLY ACHIEVE THE MAYOR'S VISION AND ONE WHICH ALL OF YOU HAVE SPOKEN TO AS WELL AS TO HOW WE ACTUALLY ACHIEVE GHAIS OUR CITY AND REDUCE THE AMOUNT OF CRASH AND INCREASE THE COMPOST WE ARE HAVING. ON WASTE REDUCTION WE IT IS

ON WASTE REDUCTION WE IT IS INVEST A TREMENDOUS AMOUNT INTO THE ACTUAL CAPITAL INFRASTRUCTURE OF OUR CITY STREETS.

NO-NO ARE WE INVESTING MORE THAN IN OUR BRIDGE AND BRIDGE PROGRAMS IS OVER SEEN BY PARRA. 40 BRIDGES IN THE CITY OF BOSTON AND MAYOR MADE IT A HUGE FOCUS FOR OUR CAPITAL BUDGET OVER THE PAST SEVERAL YEARS AND THIS YEAR TO REALLY IMPROVE THOSE BRIDGET. WE HAVE TWO BRIDGES THAT JUST WRAPPED UP SIGNIFICANT CAPITAL WORK.

THE BRIDGE IN CHARLESTOWN AND THE MASS CON BRIDGE IN THE BACK BAY .. I APPRECIATE COUNCILOR'S ZAKIM ON THE BRIDGE PROMISE. AND IN ADDITION TO THAT WE HAVE A VERY SIGNIFICANT BRIDGE PROJECT.

THE AND THEN WE HAVE THREE MORE MAJOR BRIDGE PROJECTS IN DESIGN. TO THE LONG ISLAND BRIDGE, NORTHAMPTON BRIDGE AND NORTH DALTON BRIDGE.

ALL OF WHICH PARRA IS WORKING ON.

IN ADDITION TO ALL OF THOSE PROJECTS THIS PARTICULAR CAPITAL BUDGET INCREASES THE AMOUNT OF MONEY WE ARE SPENDING ON JUST ROUTINE CAPITAL REPAIRS.
ONE OF THE BEST WAYS WE CAN ACHIEVE THIS REPAIR IS JUST TO REGULAR DLOI WHAT IS CRITICAL -- SORT OF ELEMENTS OF INVESTMENT WHICH PARRA'S TEAM IS

OVERSEEING. IN ADDITION ALL OF THE

BRIDGEWORK, PARRA'S TEAM IS ALSO

WORK OPENING A SERIES OF

RECONSTRUCTION OF MAJOR ROADWAYS

IN THE CITY OF BOSTON. THIS

THE TECHNICAL CORD MAKE SYSTEM WE USE TO COORDINATE ALL OF OUR UTILITY WORK GOING FORWARD IN THIS BUDGET AS WELL. THIS BUDGET PUTS ACTUALLY MORE MONEY THOUGH INTO SIDEWALKS THAN WE HAVE IN PREVIOUS YEARS AND THAT INCLUDES ABOUT \$200,000 WHICH GOES TO SUPPORT MIKE'S TEAM TO DO REALLY IMPORTANT SPOT REPAIRS THAT WE HEAR FROM ALL OF YOU AND FROM RESIDENTS ACROSS THE CITY. AS WELL AS ROUGHLY \$2 MILLION ADDITIONAL TO KATIE'S TEAM TO INVEST IN RECONSTRUCTION OF WHOLE SIDEWALK NETWORKS, PLACES LIKE ORCHARD GARDENS AND IS A VIN HILL .. AND BE TAKING ON OVER THE COURSE OF THIS YEAR. SO THIS BUDGET IN MANY WAYS WILL DELIVER ON THOSE TWO FUNDAMENTAL OBJECTIVES THE THEIR HAS FOR THIS TEAM AND I KNOW WE SHARE ENSURING WITH IN DELIVERING GREAT CITY SERVICES FOUR OUR RESIDENTS WE ARE DELIVERING AND DESIGNING FOR OUR NEIGHBORHOODS AND OUR ENTIRE CITY. IN CLOSING I WANT TO END WHERE COUNCILOR CIOMMO YOU LED OFF WHICH IS REALLY TO THANK THE --ALL OF YOU FOR YOUR PARTNERSHIP IN THIS EFFORT TO THANK THE MEN WHO I AM JOINED WITH HERE. THE MEN WHO ARE UP IN THE GALLERY AND MOST IMPORTANTLY THE MEN WHO CAN'T BE HERE TODAY BECAUSE THEY ARE OUT ON THE STREETS JUST DELIVERING THE BASIC CITY SERVICES WE ALL DEPEND ON. THANK YOU AND LOOK FORWARD TO YOUR QUESTIONS. >> THANK YOU. >> WE ARE STILL WORKING THROUGH A TILE NUMBER IN PART BECAUSE -- COST SHARED IN MULTIPLE DEPARTMENTS SOME DROPPED FROM THE \$24 MILLION LINE ITEM THAT DO NOT INCLUDE PUBLIC WORKS. AND WE CAN BE INVESTING IN SOME NECESSARY REPAIRS TO THINGS LIKE OUR SALT SHEDS AND INVESTMENTS IN OUR PLOWING EQUIPMENT, SO WE DON'T QUITE HAVE A FINAL NUMBER YET BUT IT WILL BALLPARK LIKELY BE UNDER 24 BUT DON'T HAVE A BALLPARK.

WHEN YOU GET THAT IF YOU COULD PASS IT ALONG I WOULD APPRECIATE IT.

AND THEN JUST TO DIVE RIGHT INTO THE WASTE REDUCTION, I WANT TO, YOU KNOW, COMMEND THE MAYOR'S COMMITMENT TO RECYCLING, BUT, YOU KNOW, AGAIN, AS SOMEONE WHO CAME HERE IN 2008, BEFORE SINGLE STREAM, WE ALL HAD TO, YOU KNOW, DIVVY UP ALL OF OUR GLASS AND PLASTIC AND PAPER AND WE THOUGHT WE WOULD SEE A GREAT INCREASE IN RECYCLING.

OF THE 200,000 TONS WE THROW AWAY, ROUGHLY 30 PERCENT IS COMPOSTABLE, ROUGHLY 30 PERCENT IS RECYCLABLE, A LARGE AMOUNT OF FOOD WASTE AND YARD WASTE THAT ARE IN THE WASTE STREAM AND THAT'S WHY THE MAYOR A YEAR AGO KICKED OFF AN EFFORT IN COLLABORATION WITH THE ENVIRONMENT DEPARTMENT AND THIS

DEPARTMENT TO CREATE A WASTE PLANT WHICH WE WILL BE RELEASING OVER THE COURSE OF THE SPRING WHICH HAS A SERIES OF RECOMMENDATIONS ABOUT HOW WE CAN ACTUALLY INCREASE OUR RECYCLING NUMBERS AND INCREASE OUR COMPOSTING NUMBERS AS WELL. THERE ARE SOME THINGS IN THIS BUDGET WHICH ACTUALLY ALLOW US TO TAKE STEPS THIS THAT DIRECTION. YARD WAY IS ONE I THINK VERY GOOD EXAMPLE OF THAT. ZOO AGAIN, IF YOU LOCK AT THAT 200,000 TONS WE ARE THROWING AWAY, 30 PARTICIPANT OF THAT IS COME POSTABLE AND A GOOD CHUNK OF THAT IS ACTUALLY YARD WASTE. WE ARE GOING TO CHANGE -- WE ARE GOING TO SIGNIFICANTLY INCREASE THE AMOUNT OF DAYS SOMEONE CAN DROP OFF YARD WASTE IN THE CITY OF BOSTON THIS YEAR. RIGHT NOW 18 WEEKS OF THE YEAR WE TO CURB SIDE WASTE COLLECTION AND INCREASE IN THIS BUDGET TO 20 WEEKS OF YARD WASTE COLLECTION PLUS ON AT LEAST 20 ADDITIONAL WEEKS WE ARE GOING HAVE A PLACE THAT RESIDENTS CAN ACTUALLY DROP OFF THEIR YARD WASTE. SO THAT FOR MOST OF THE YEAR IF NOT THE ENTIRETY OF THE YEAR WE HAVE A WAY WE CAN TAKE REGARD WASTE OUT OF TRASH BAGS AND GET IT TO A PLACE THAT IS COME POSTED AND IF THE FOLKS KNOW THAT ONCE IT GETS COME POSTED GETS .. TO SUPPORT COMMUNITY GARDEN DENGUE IN OUR CITY. LET ME RECOGNIZE COUNCILOR ANDREA CAMPBELL WHO JOINED US AT THE BEGINNING 0 YOUR PRESENTATION. SO HELP ME UNDERSTAND HOW THE

BOOSTING OUR COMMUNITY OUTREACH, OUR EDUCATION, OUR ADVERTISING ON THINGS LIKE BIG VALLEY TRASH CANS TO GET THE MESSAGE OUT HOW TO RECYCLE RIGHT TO LOWER THE CONTAMINATION RATE. THAT ACTUALLY IS BETTER FOR ENVIRONMENT AND BETTER FOR THE BOTTOM ROIN. WHEN YOU SEE RECYCLING COST GOSS UP SIGNIFICANTLY IN A VERY SHORT PERIOD OF TIME WE NEED TO PUT AN EMPHASIS ON THAT AND I THINK THAT IS GOING TO REQUIRE OUR SPECIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT TO BE OUT ON THE STREET AL SIDE OF OUR METER MAIDS AND TOW TRUCKS AND THIS BE A JOINT EFFORT TO WORK ON THIS.

I DON'T KNOW THE ADS ARE WORKING AND I DON'T THINK PEOPLE ARE TUNED INTO WHAT THEY SHOULD BE AND NOT PUTTING IN THE BLUE BINS.

I ACTUALLY HAVE GOTTEN QUITE A FEW LETTERS, CALLS FROM CONSTITUENTS WHO WEREN'T THRILLED WITH THE CURRENT, OUR CURRENT CONTRACTOR AND ASKING WHERE WE ARE ON REVIEWING THAT, RENEWING -- CAN YOU SPEAK TO THAT? >> SO WE ARE GOING TO THE CONTRACT PROCESS RIGHT NOW. AND CAN UPDATE YOU ON THE SPECIFICS I THINK SHORTLY. I THINK NO MATTER WHAT, WE TAKE A LOT OF PRIDE AND PAY A LOT OF ATTENTION TO MAKING SURE THAT TRASH COLLECTION, RECYCLING COLLECTION, YARD WAY COLLECTION IS DONE REALLY WELL. REGARDLESS OF WHO THE CONTRACTOR IS AND THERE ARE A NUMBER OF THINGS. BOTH STRUCTURAL AND OPERATIONAL THAT I THINK ALLOW THAT TO BE THE CASE. ONE IS THE MOVING CODE ENFORCEMENT OVER TO PUBLIC WORKS WHICH I THEY REALLY BOOSTED OUR ABILITY TO ENSURE TRASH COLLECTION IS DONE WELL. SECOND. WE HAVE IN THIS COMING CONTRACTS WE ARE PUTTING A HIGHER LEVEL OR HIGHER STANDARD IN PLACE FOR THE USE OF GPS ON ALL TRASH COLLECTION CONTRACTS. THIRD TO MAKE IT MUCH CLEARER THE FINES ASSOCIATED WITH FAILING TO DO CERTAIN CONTRACT PROVISIONS AND THIRD GIVE A LOT OF CREDIT TO BRIAN, JERI, TO THEIR TEAM FOR -- FOR REALLY MANAGING THESE CONTRACTORS WELL. IN YOUR DISTRICT AND FOR -- ONE OF THE THINGS WHICH WILL HELP TRASH ON THE CURB LESS AND BE ABLE TO GET US THROUGH THE CITY FASTER, MAYBE ADJUSTING THE START TIME OF TRASH COLLECTION

DOWN TO 6:00 A.M.

>> I GUESS I MEAN, I KNOW THERE

IS MORE THAN ONE -- I KNOW THAT THE CURRENT ONES, SUNRISE, YOU KNOW, -- I THINK IS DOING A FINE JOB.

AND WHAT PROVISIONS YOU
MENTIONED GPS PERFORMANCE, I
MEAN, ARE THERE PENALTIES FOR
THAT AND OBVIOUS IS YOUR AT THE
PRESENT TIME THE ENFORCING
AGENCY FOR LACK OF A BETTER WORD
OR IS SOMEONE GOING TO HAVE TO
WORK ITS WAY THROUGH LAW
DEPARTMENT OR SOMETHING ELSE,
ENFORCEMENT AND STANDARDS IS

I THINK PARTICULARLY IN THE DENSER NEIGHBORHOODS LIKE COUNCILOR LYNN SHARES, SOME OF THE AREAS WE SHARE, BEACON HILL, DOWNTOWN, AND THE ALLEYS, CAN YOU SPEAK TO THAT?

>> AND MIKE DOUGLAS, IN THIS CONTRACT WE SPELL OUT CLEARLY THE STANDARDS WOULD BE HEALTHY -- AND FAILING TO MEET THOSE STANDARDS AND WILL BE ENFORCED BY PUBLIC WORKS.

I DO THINK ONE OF THE REASONS
WHY WE HAVE ZONE SOME
SIGNIFICANT IMPROVEMENT OVER THE
LAST FIVE YEARS ALL HAVE TO DO
WITH THE CONSTITUENTS.
I THINK WE HAVE DONE SOME REALLY
GREAT PARTNERSHIPS ACROSS THE
CITY TO MAKE SURE THAT TRASH IS

BEING PUT OUT IN A GREAT WAY OR RECYCLING IS PUT OUT IN A GREAT WAY.

I THINK ALL OF THAT --

>> ON THIS TOPIC, I KNOW FOLKS DON'T WANT TO GO BACK TO I THINK PRIOR CONTRACTOR. THEY LIKE HOW THINGS ARE NOW OBVIOUSLY, IF THAT IS FISCALLY RESPONSIBLE DECISION, THE RESULTS ARE PORN IN HOLDING

WHOEVER IT IS ACCOUNTABLE. >> SECOND, I KNOW I AM ON THE

CLOCK OVER HERE, THE PILOT PROGRAM WE HAVE IN THE CITY OF BOSTON, COUNCILOR FLAHERTY AND I

SPENT SOME TIME ON WIT

COMMISSIONER CHRISTOPHER, RIGHT NOW, I HAVE CONCERNED ABOUT

NEWBURY STREET, IN PARTICULAR, AND IT HAS BEEN GOING ON, I TOOK A WALL WITH COMMISSIONER CHRISTOPHER WITH SOME NEIGHBORS THE OTHER DAY, IT SEEMS LIKE ONE, EVEN GIVEN THE CURRENT ORDINANCE WHICH I AM NOT A SUPPORTER OF BY 80, 90 PERCENT OF THE SIGNS DON'T COMPLY WITH THAT ON NEWBURY STREET, AT LEAST, AND, YOU KNOW, CODE ENFORCEMENT IS EMPOWERED, YOUR DEPARTMENT TO GO AND PICK THEM UP OFF THE STREET, IT IS A PRETTY BASIC STANDARD. I WOULD LIKE TO CHANGE THAT RULE AND ELIMINATE THEM ALTOGETHER ON NEWBURY STREET BUT THAT IS FOR 0 A DIFFERENT DAY. CAN YOU SPEAK TO THAT AND IS THIS THE BEST WAY? HOW ARE YOU RESPONDING TO THOSE

COMPLAINTS?

>> MIKE CAN TALK TO PROBABLY AFTER YOUR CONVERSATION WITH MR. -- AND REACHED OUT TO US. WE WOULD LIKE TO SIT DOWN WITH YOU.

I THINK PART IS EDUCATING ALL OF THE SMALL BUSINESS OWNERS ALONG THE STREET ABOUT WHAT THE REGULATIONS ARE ALONG NEWBURY STREET AND TAKE APPROPRIATION ACTIONS FOR WITH CODE ENFORCEMENT IF THEY DON'T FOLLOW UP.

>> SO I WILL SAY I WOULD HOPE AND I WOULD ASK ACTUALLY THAT YOUR DEPARTMENT, IF THERE ARE COMPLAINT TO JUST GO OUT AND PICK UP THE SIGNS. I AM NOT ADVOCATE AGO SWEEP WITHOUT MORE EDUCATION AND I HAVE TALKED TO BOTH BUSINESS ASSOCIATIONS FOR THAT AREA.

I KNOW THEY ARE IN TOUCH WITH BOTH THE NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION, MR. CHRISTOPHER. PROBABLY, SOME OF YOUR FOLKS, BUT WHEN PEOPLE ARE ACTUALLY MAKING THE REPORTS. IF THEY COULD GO AND GET PICKED UP. I SEE YOUR EMPLOYEES, I SEE YOUR TEAM OUT THERE DOING A GREAT JOB OF EMPTYING THE RECYCLING BINS AND TRASH ON NEWBURY STREET, IT IS A BIT OF A BURDEN TO BUSINESSES BUT THE RULES ARE PRETTY CLEAR.

I THINK OVER LILACS -- OVERLY LACKS BUT EVEN GIVEN THAT WE SAW ADVERTISEMENTS FOR CIGARETTES WHICH ARE SPECIFICALLY PROHIBITED, MOST OF THE SIGNS DID NOT HAVE THE BUSINESS ADDRESS, PHONE NUMBER ON IT AS REOUIRED. SO I AM GOING TO BE USING 301 MYSELF TO REPORT THESE.

I KNOW MANY OF OUR RESIDENTS ARE IN CONCERT WITH EDUCATION. I KNOW THERE ARE OUR COMMISSION IS LOOKING AT SETTING SOME STANDARDS TO ADDRESS THIS AND, YOU KNOW, I APPRECIATE THIS IS PROBABLY UNIQUE TO THIS STREET, THE PROGRAM SEEMS TO BE WORKING WELL.

I DIDN'T GET ANY COMPLAINT ABOUT IT IN MISSION HILL OR THE FENWAY OR EVEN SO MUCH IN BEACON HILL, BUT IT IS THE CROWDS AND THE PROLIFERATION GIVEN THAT ON NEWBURY STREET WE HAVE A BUILDING WITH MAYBE 30 FEET. 40 FEET OF FRONTAGE AND FOUR BUSINESSES IN IT ON A SIDEWALK THAT IS, YOU KNOW, THIS BIG AND PARTICULAR I ON THE WEEKENDS WHEN YOU HAVE HUNDREDS AND THOUSAND OF PEOPLE WHICH IS GREAT, WE NEED TO DO THAT. SO I WILL CONTINUE TO ASK THAT A PROMPT RESPONSE IS THERE. THANK YOU.

>> THANK YOU.

I FAILED TO MESSAGE ONE OTHER PERSON FROM CODE IMPORTANT, STEVE -- WHO DOES SOME OF THE MOST DIFFICULT WORK WITH HOMEOWNERS AND OTHER ISSUES IN NEIGHBORHOODS. SO COUNCILOR MCCARTHY.

>> THANK YOU VERY MUCH, MR. CHAIR.

THANK YOU. EVERYBODY FOR BEING HERE.

MY WHOLE DEPARTMENT I ALWAYS

LOVE THIS HEARING, BECAUSE I ALWAYS GENERALLY ONLY HAVE GOOD THINGS TO SAY BUT I DO WANT TO START OUT WITH SOME THANK YOUS. THESE ARE REALLY MY GO TO PEOPLE WHO ALWAYS PICK UP THE PHONE, SATURDAY, SUNDAY, DOESN'T MATTER, MARK, ERIC PRENTISS, ZACH, DENNIS ROACH, FREDDIE MY KROFT, COAKLEY, LINSKY AND OF COURSE STEVE TANGLE LITERALLY AT ANY EVENT, ANY TIME OF DAY I CAN ALWAYS SEND HIM A TEXT AND GET AN ANSWER BACK AND WROTE THINK PEOPLE REALIZE HOW HARD PEOPLE WORK BEHIND THE SCENES. NOT JUST FROM 8:00 TO 4:00 OR 8 TO SEVEN TO THREE, TWHEAFER WORKING HOURS ARE, JUST A COUPLE OF THINGS. I WANT TO THANK PARRA SOCIAL FOR ALL OF THE UPGRADES COMING TO REEDVILLE AND HYDE PARK. DANA, HYDE PARK INTERSECTION, WELL OVER \$2,000, \$4 MILLION FOR THE BRIDGE, THIS HAS BEEN A LONG TIME COMING FOR THAT AREA. >> THEY CAN CORRECT ME ON THAT BUT WE ARE GOING TO THE WHITE LINES AND NOT THE WAG GONE WHEELS GOING FORWARD.
I THINK MIKE CAN TALK MORE ABOUT THIS IN THE BBD HEARING TOMORROW BUT WE STEPPED UP THE CROSSWALK STRIPING INVESTMENT, AND WE HAVE DONE I BELIEVE ABOUT 1,200, MAYBE ABOUT 1,200 RESTRIPING OF THE CROSSWALKS THIS PAST YEAR. AND ROUGHLY A \$2 MILLION ANNUAL INVESTMENT.
